## EXPERTS PICK ALL-EASTERN IDEAL LINEUPS

Less Divergence of Opinion Than Usual in Selections—Cagle and Strong Favorites—Harpster Favored for Quarterback.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—Less divergence of opinion than has been the case in other years was expressed in the consensus of two score experts who assisted the Associated Press in the selection of the 1928 all-eastern football team. Sports writers and coaches who picked the all-stars in the east were agreed largely on a majority of the positions.

Only one selection failed to include the elusive Christian Koenig, Cagle, the Army halfback, and only two could not see Kenneth Strong, the fleet and powerful New York University star as a member of the backfield. Howard Harpster, Carnegie Tech's punter and field general, ran far ahead in the vote for quarterback, and Paul Seull, Pennsylvania's versatile captain, maintained a commanding lead for the fullback position. Seull and Strong were given votes for both the halfback and fullback places.

Chuck Howe, Princeton's great captain, was never in danger of being crowded out for center, for less than half a dozen experts overlooked him.

Not Burke won a guard position for the Navy by a wide margin, but Bruce Dumont of Colgate was hard pressed by "Frip" Greene of Yale and Captain Carroll of Georgetown.

Two captains, Al Lissman of New York university, and Bud Sprague of the army, ran ahead of their rivals for back positions with Moore of Georgetown, a clever kicker a good third.

Rosenzweig, Carnegie Tech end, was well in front for his place, with Ed Messenger of army leading the Skilbe's popularity, but leading Harbrace of N. Y. and Stinson of Princeton, who qualified for the second team, Lawler of Princeton and Provincial of Georgetown were barely noted out.

H. J. Stogeman, track coach, directed the practice yesterday of the few remaining members of the varsity squad. Doubt has been generally expressed that any of the men will be sufficiently recovered by Saturday to enter the game.

## TROJAN GAME PAID BIG SUM SATURDAY

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 4.—(P)—The "gate" of last Saturday's intercollegiate football clash between Notre Dame and Southern California was \$321,000, the largest to which the Trojans ever played.

Southern California officials, announcing the figures today, said that the only Pacific coast "gate" to exceed last Saturday's is that of the Stanford-California games in the north, where all seats sell for a uniform price—\$5. The Notre Dame-Southern California struggle in Soldiers Field, Chicago, last year drew less and many thousands more witnessed that encounter.

After all expenses of the game, California retained and officials' salaries had been paid out, Notre Dame and Southern California split the remainder into two equal portions.

## SCHISSLER DETAINED IN CHI BY INFLUENZA

CHICAGO, Dec. 4.—(P)—Coach Paul Schissler of the Oregon State College football team, was ordered to a hospital here yesterday by physicians, because of influenza.
