Dillard, who was in Medford from his duties in Ashland as resident engineer for the new water system project there. The capacity of the dam is just 60 times as much as the capacity of Medford's two water reservoirs, each of which has a capacity of 2,000,000 gallons. However, the flow of water here is more constant, having its source from big gushing springs, while Ashland's supply is largely dependent upon mountain snow.
