

# BOLIVIAN TROOPS AND PARAGUAYAN FORCES IN CLASH

**BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 7.—(AP)—**A dispatch to La Nación today from Asuncion, Paraguay, said that another clash had occurred between Paraguayan and Bolivian troops.

The dispatch said that Paraguayan troops had been fired upon when they found a fort built by the Bolivians near the boundary line.

The Paraguayans were stated to have returned the fire and captured several officers and soldiers.

There is a serious boundary dispute between Bolivia and Paraguay. The two republics signed a protocol in April, 1927, which established at Buenos Aires a joint commission to settle the question. No settlement has been reached, however, and in October Paraguayan newspapers claimed that Bolivians were advancing into the disputed region.

# FOG LIFTING AS COLD SNAP IS MODERATED

The practically continuous fog that has existed all this week so far apparently began to dissipate early this afternoon when the sun's rays broke through sufficiently to expose small patches of the sky, and also the temperature, the minimum of which this morning was 25, one degree less than that of yesterday, began to moderate.

No accidents due to the slippery and ice coated pavements and the clouded over windshields were reported late yesterday or this forenoon. The air mail planes again landed at the emergency field on the Barron ranch south of Ashland instead of at the Medford airport, and were practically on time.

Cloudy weather is forecast for tonight and Saturday, but not so cold a temperature tonight as has been prevailing.
