## ART EXHIBITION AT SNEDECOR SHOP IS OPENED TO PUBLIC

Thirty-four water color and oil paintings by Robert Hallowell, young and famous American artist, hang this week in the Jane Snedecor shop on the fourth floor of the Medford building, where local art lovers may come and view them at will.

Hallowell, who was born in Denver, Colo., and graduated from Harvard, is a genuine product of American education and ideals—to the extent of searching for most of his inspiration abroad. He found it principally in the sunny climes of Spain, Normandy and Paris. And the spirit of those old world scenes are interpreted with the dauntless sweep of the full-blooded young American that he is.

In fact, Hallowell's success gives proof to the observation that a painter, as well as a prophet, is without honor in his own country; for the simple reason that if he is a prophet or a painter worth disagreeing with, his conceptions of other and foreign landscapes are far more interesting to all parties concerned than are those of his own.

Hallowell is a master of dresden, but never its slave. Details that go beyond the horizon of scenes he depicts, and fade into the purple overtones of twilight are triumphs of his art, in which the on-looking student stands in a thrill of admiration.

The cluttered streets of Paris are given a new and clean expression beneath the wash of the young American, without omission of their ancient and mellowed aristocracy. A good example of this is the scene marked No. 4 in the collection and entitled "Rue Tronchet, Paris."

Here the movement and haze of the commercial world is intermingled with the warm reassurance of Parisian gaiety through the medium of this artist's color manipulation that at close range appears to be a series of aimless and disorderly daubs.

This, and the 33 other fine pieces in this exhibition, cannot be reviewed adequately here. Nor would the art-loving public be interested in reading about them if they were. The principal news value of this announcement is that the collection is here for only a limited time and the public is welcome to come to the Snedecor shop and study them to its heart's content.
