

MORE PHOTOS OF DIXIE TITLE GIVEN FORMER MEDFORD GOLDEN TORNADO; FOOTBALL HEROES FLORIDA BEATEN

Come now the hickens of the Medford high school football champions of 1919, to take their place in the "rookie's gallery" in front of the Palmer Music House, along with other battling eleven in local history.

Those were the days when football coaches were derbies set at a jaunty angle on the side of the head and looked proudly sideways at the boys as their pictures were being taken. Some of "the boys" in this group, include such well known local citizens as Chet Stuart, Sheldon Hill, Pinkie Rader, Ralph Burgess and Bill Scroggins.

Next in line from the champions of 1914, the year otherwise made notable by the masculine side parting way to the short clipped pompadour. Bobby Pelouse, who, three years later, became captain of the Stanford team, played end for the honor and glory of Medford high. Others shown in this group are: Chet Baker, guard; Dolph Phillips, tackle and Charlie Ray, guard.

The early earmarks of shikdom can be traced in the 1915 eleven, with their neatly uniform sweaters and slicked back pompadours. This was the first year Otto Klum, now with the University of Hawaii, acted as coach here. Just having graduated from college, he looked younger than some of the boys on the team. Included in this group are Jesse Gentry, Bob Strane, Cliff Seely, who is now coaching football at a boys' school in northern California, Bill Mitchell, Carter Brandon and Howard Thomas.

The prize contribution to the collection came from O. W. Fox yesterday, who brought in a picture of the Ashland football team of 1896—back in the days when men were men, and football coaches wore House of David beards. Tight fitting canvas vests, sweaters of every description and what-its from the faculty, parent, composed the garb of these lusty heroes, whose team was built from both faculty and student body. F. W. Miles played end on this team.

ATLANTA, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Georgia Tech's Golden Tornado swept to undisputed championship of the Southern conference today by crushing its ancient rival, the University of Georgia, 29 to 0.

The Georgia Bulldogs, however, provided sufficient thrills. Thirty-five thousand saw Miffett, Georgia end, take a pass over the goal and white goal line in the first period to give his team a 6 to 0 lead. It was the first time this season any team has held a margin over Tech.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 8.—The Volunteers of Tennessee, playing with all the dash and daring skill of youth, scattered the Southern conference championship hopes of Florida today in a thrilling climax to one of the greatest Dixie gridiron seasons.

The sturdy sons of Tennessee, with a scrappy fast charging line and three sensational sophomores in the backfield, ripped into the defense of the country's highest powered scoring machine, tore it apart in the first half with a bewildering attack and had the stuff to turn back Florida's desperate counter thrust that fell only a single point shy of squaring the count.

Tennessee's final margin was 13 to 12, so close that chills were running up and down the spines of volunteer partisans as Florida, darkened the air with passes in the final part of the game, yet sufficient to wind up the home team's season in triumphant fashion.

A wildly excited crowd of 17,000, including Governor Horton of Tennessee, filled every available inch of Shields Watkins field to see the Volunteers not only spoil Florida's hopes of sharing the southern title with Georgia Tech but strengthen their claims to a share of the national gridiron spotlight for 1929.

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 8.—(AP)—A brilliant 80-yard run across the goal line by Jimmy Bergsdo, making his final appearance in a college gridiron game and a place kick enabled Creighton university to defeat Marquette in a post-season game here this afternoon 9 to 6.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Dec. 8.—(AP)—Alabama's massive crimson tide was forced to release its fully fury in the season's football finale here this afternoon to defeat Louisiana State's Purple and Gold Tiger 13 to 0.

Going straight football for three periods, the Tide put over a touchdown earlier in the first half, and Alvin Campbell, late in the final period scored the second.

DELAY ACTION ON TILDEN'S PLEA TO BE REINSTATED

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Definite action on the application for reinstatement of Big Bill Tilden was postponed until Friday by the executive committee of the United States Lawn Tennis association at its December meeting today.

Tilden's application for reinstatement was considered briefly today, but the committee voted to refer it to the Amateur Rule committee with instructions that the body investigating it further, correspond and confer with Tilden and report at the next meeting of the executive committee, set for February 8 in Boston, the day before the annual meeting of the Lawn Tennis association.

In connection with the Tilden case, the Davis Cup committee recommended to the executive committee, which approved it, adoption of the following rule:

"No player while a member of the Davis Cup, Wightman Cup or International team representing the United States, shall write or give interviews or contribute in any way tennis material to newspapers, magazines or other publications, including radio talks whether or not for a consideration."

The Davis cup committee announced it would recommend adoption of this rule as the association's annual meeting February 9. It was his newspaper articles on the Wimbledon tournament while he was a member of the American Davis cup team that led to Tilden's disbarment from amateur competition last summer.

TROJANS CHOSEN FOOTBALL CHAMPS AND WIN TROPHY

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Dec. 8.—(AP)—Under the Dickinson rating system, the Trojans of Southern California, are the national football champions of America for 1928. The University of California was second.

Frank G. Dickinson of the economics department of the University of Illinois and originator of the system, announced the ratings today. The Trojans win a leg on the Jack F. Rissman national intercollegiate football trophy. Notre Dame won it in 1924, the first year it was awarded, followed by Dartmouth, Stanford and Illinois. Three national championship awards in 19 years are necessary for permanent possession of the trophy.

Dickinson said the Trojans were given the honor by a good margin which was increased by their recent triumph over Notre Dame.

Georgia Tech was given third place. Dickinson said its schedule was easier than the other contenders, but that its record was impressive.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—(AP)—The New York Evening Post says today that Walter Robinson, president-manager of the Brooklyn National League Baseball club, will be relieved of his duties as president and the office offered to Frank B. York, present attorney for the club, at a meeting Monday.

The story adds that "Robbie" will be paid in full for the duration of his managerial contract which expires at the close of next season, and that the Dodgers will enter the 1929 campaign under a new manager not now identified with the club.
