AVIATION SEAT PAYS TRIBUTE TO INVENTORS

Civic Celebration Honors Wrights - Old Hangar Viewed By Officials - Giant Planes Bring Foreign Delegations Dayton.

By William E. Berchtold. Associated Press Aviation Editor. DAYTON, Ohio, Dec. 10.—(AP)—The "cradle of aviation" today paid tribute to the man who rocked the cradle during the trying years of aviation's early history.

Regardless of whether anyone ever questioned the ability of the Wrights to fly in those early days, today found a thoroughly "air minded" city ready to honor its first citizen. Seventy-five delegates from foreign nations, including many diplomatic officials and aeronautical experts, joined in the full day's celebration.

The foreign delegations, together with government air officials, were to pay tribute to the memory of Wilbur Wright this afternoon in a visit to his grave in Woodland cemetery.

Brigadier General Lord Thomson, former British minister of the air, and Pierre Etienne Flandin, vice-president of the French chamber of deputies, were to carry the world's message of honor and recognition to Mr. Wright in addresses at tonight's banquet.

TRAFFIC VIOLATORS HARD HIT BY ROSE CITY SPEED POLICE

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 10.—(AP) Starting their drive against traffic law violators, police over Sunday arrested 161 persons. In court today 64 of these showed up, and fines aggregating \$228.50 were imposed.

Driving while drunk brought a 30-day sentence and driver's license suspended for one year. Penalties for this offense in the past have been fines of \$10 or \$15, with no suspension.

Going against a traffic signal today cost \$5; heretofore the fine has been \$2. Improper lights jumped to \$2.50 or \$5, against the usual fine of \$1. Failure to give right of way cost \$7.50 against the ordinary penalty of \$1 up. Improper license plates went up from \$1 to \$2.50 and \$5.

EUGENE GIRL IS REPORTED LOST IN WOODS

Separated From Companion Sunday, Fay Wilbur Wandering Forest Near Siuslaw Falls—Ranchers and Legion Men Start Search

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 10.—(AP)—Fay Wilbur, 29, daughter of Mrs. Florence Wilbur, Eugene, was lost today somewhere in the dense forests near Siuslaw Falls, just west of Lanes and about twenty miles from Eugene.

Since Sunday afternoon when the girl became separated from her companion, Walter Weber, she has been alone in the woods without food or shelter and with only thin clothing to protect her from the rain and weather.

A score of farmers and ranchers under direction of J. W. King, started search for the girl when young Weber sounded the alarm late Sunday. A score more, members of the Eugene Obsidians and the American Legion started today to work under J. Ed Turnbull and Henry Korn.

Yosemite Leads National Parks For Popularity

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Yosemite in California again was recorded as the most popular national park in 1928, with almost double the number of visitors that went to Platt in Oklahoma, its closest contender.

The tabulated total of visitors to national parks submitted to the house interior department appropriations subcommittee showed that there were almost 200,000 more visitors to national parks in 1928 than in the preceding year. More than two and a half million went through their gates in the past season.

There were 469,619 visitors to Yosemite, 280,638 to Platt, 235,007 to Rocky Mountain, 220,984 to Yellowstone, and 199,999 to Hot Springs, the five most popular.

HOLDUP KILLED BY RESORT MAN

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 10.—(AP)—A bandit, believed to be Paddy O'Brien of Seattle, was killed and his would-be victim, Julian Tison, was critically wounded as the result of a gun duel in a resort on the Mount Rainier highway 22 miles southeast of Tacoma last night.

Two bandits entered the resort and held up Mrs. Tison. Her husband in the kitchen, saw what was going on through a glass in the door. He got his gun and was aiming at the bandit when the latter saw him. Mrs. Tison struggled with the bandit to keep him from shooting her husband. Tison shot and the bandit slumped and then staggered out the front door on the highway where he dropped dead. His companion fired twice at Tison one bullet entering his stomach and the other grazing his side.

REFUGEE FAMILIES FROM MID-WEST STRANDED IN CITY

Four families, comprising 15 or 16 people are stranded here, according to word received at the county judge's office this morning. Beset by floods, and other Middle West inconveniences, the families, loaded a few necessities in their trucks and headed for the West, after 25 years' residence near Caldwell, Duncan county, Missouri. They have no funds or food, and their cases were brought to official notice, by reports from the outlying districts of people seeking alms.

Investigation showed that they had come to this section, after reading literature regarding Oregon. The county will take steps today, to temporarily relieve the impoverishment of the Missourians. Daily appeals for help are filed with the county at this season of the year from transients, who are hungry and out of gas. This is a heavy drain. Generally, these are children to be considered. Last week, the Red Cross was visited by a man, who was "hitch-hiking" from San Francisco to Portland, with his wife and a two-year old child. He sought transportation to Portland and food.

The common practice in many states is to furnish indigent transients with a full gas tank, and shunt them thus, upon the next city, but according to Miss Lillian Roberts of the Red Cross, this practice is tabooed here.
