

CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE RECEIVING AID OF WORKERS

The twenty-first annual Christmas seal sale is in full swing with Chris Gottlieb in the Chamber of Commerce building serving as the clearing house. Mr. Gottlieb gives out the seals to the many volunteer workers selling in booths down town and takes in the money at the end of the day. He also renders this same service to the rural schools as the teachers ask for more seals or turn in their sales as they are beginning to do already. This help from Mr. Gottlieb, which he does in addition to his strenuous duties as appointment secretary, is another example of service in a good cause—that of raising funds for the fight against tuberculosis.

The active campaign this year is being conducted by Mrs. R. E. Green, chief assistant to Mrs. Alice Holloway, the pioneer public health worker of Jackson county. Mrs. Green announced that the seal sales at the banks in the stores and post office began Saturday with the high school girls in charge. The Presbyterian Ladies Guild had the booths Monday and the Legion Auxiliary is in charge today. The following is the schedule up to the last day:

The Daughters of the American Revolution December 12, Parent-Teacher associations December 13, Greater Medford Club December 14, Junior high school girls December 15, College Woman's club December 17, P. E. O. December 18, Altar society of the Catholic church December 19, Lady Ethel December 20, Eastern Star December 21 and the girls of the high school again on December 22.

Last week the seals were placed in the local public schools, the Catholic academy, and Valley school for the children are eager to do their part in this annual campaign and are selling seals in their homes.

From the 500 letters mailed on December 1 exactly \$500 has been received, which is the best record by the eleventh day, and of course many letters have not yet made their return trip to Mrs. Holloway with payment for the enclosed seals or a liberal donation.

DEAD INDIAN FOLK WANT ROAD BUILT KLAMATH HIWAY

Residents of the Dead Indian district, have prepared a petition asking for a county road, from a point near the Emigrant dam to the Elliott place on the Klamath Falls-Ashland highway, which they will present to the county court Wednesday, January 2. A 60-foot right of way is asked, and the petition is widely signed by residents of the Dead Indian district and Ashland. It is claimed that the road will shorten the distance to Ashland, northern California points, and Klamath Falls, and open up a recreational field.

An article from a special correspondent of the Portland Oregonian at Gold Hill, and published in that paper Monday, declaring that the road work of the county next year would be on the Gold Hill-Trail road, which connects with the Crozer Lake highway near the Rogue River bridge, proved to be news to the county engineer and county officials. County Engineer Rynning said this morning that no extensive operations on the Gold Hill-Trail road were planned on the 1929 program, but that an application had been filed that asked that the road between Beagle and the Dodge bridge be improved. He said this was a matter for the future.

It is in the intention of the county to center its energies next year in the construction of the Lake Creek market road, which receives financial aid from the state, and the co-operation of the forest service. Residents of the Lake Creek road, have been promised a first class road for years, and the fulfillment thereof will be the first objective of the county.

PIONEERS RECOVERING FROM PREVAILING FLU

Mrs. Sarah A. Central of Jacksonville, aged 83 years, a pioneer woman, known to scores of Jackson county residents, has recovered sufficiently from an attack of the prevailing influenza, to leave her bed, after ten days' illness. She is still under the care of a nurse, but is on the mend. Her condition was regarded as serious for a few days, because of her advanced age.

John Kramer, aged 94 years, another pioneer of Jacksonville and a former jeweler there, is also recovering from a severe attack of the flu, and is now out of danger.

DR. KRAMER SEES NO CONFLICT FOR SCIENCE AND BIBLE

"Was Your Daddy a Monkey?" drew a big Monday night crowd at the Baptist revival meeting last night. "Big Jim" was at his best, doubly inspired by his subject and the apparent enthusiasm of his audience.

He discussed, in a sane, positive way, some of the mooted questions of the day; among them that of evolution and the Bible. Dr. Kramer said that there is no conflict between real science and the Bible. He asked whether evolution was science or religion, and then quoted prominent evolutionists to the effect that evolution is a religion. He then called attention to the teaching of religion in the public schools and said, "American and un-American, and un-evolution is a science, then teach it in our public schools; if it is a religion, it has no place in our public school system and no one has any more right to teach it in schools than I have to teach Baptist church doctrine in the public schools."

Dr. Kramer answered the question as to where Cain got his wife by saying that there were three possible answers, namely: Cain married his own blood relation; he married a beast of the field or there were other human beings created as Adam and Eve were created. This latter view he holds, alleging that the Bible references are favorable to such position; and that these other lines of human beings became extinct at the time of the flood.

Sunday was a notable day, in these revival meetings and it is expected that they will continue to increase in crowds and interest this week. This afternoon there was an enthusiastic rally of the "Go-Getters," composed of boys and girls. These children's meetings will be held, after school, all week. This evening Dr. Kramer will speak on "Who is Right, the 'Pros,' the 'Pos,' or the 'N.T.'s'?"

BUSSES MAKING REGULAR TRIPS MEDFORD TODAY

The busses leave the corner of Central and Main every 20 minutes and have two routes. The first route begins at this intersection, goes east on Main to the end of the paving, then west on Main to Columbus and back to the starting place. The second bus has a much longer route and includes a good sized number of streets, covering the central portion of the city. The busses are neat appearing and are said to be easy riding.
