SNOW FOOT DEEP ON GREEN SPRING AND IN SISKIYOU

Rain, fog and sunshine, alternately have prevailed here since Sunday night. The much snow has been falling in the high mountain districts, and rain is forecast for tonight and Wednesday, along with a moderate temperature.

This total rainfall was almost record breaking since it was the heaviest during a 24-hour period since November 8-9 last year 1927, when there was a fall of 2.92 inches.

The total rainfall here so far since September 1 last, is 4.68 inches. There is a foot of snow on the Green Spring mountain highway, and about the same depth on the Pacific highway up in the Siskiyou.

Another dense fog came in today, which started in Sunday night, which lasted until about noon, when the sun broke through, giving the populace its first good view of the sky for a week.

CHRISTMAS MAIL INCREASES HERE; PEAK ON FRIDAY

The Medford and valley people who do not mail their Christmas presents for the eastern or middle West states before next Saturday night will be out of luck as far as any chance of their presents being received before Christmas day, on which day the postoffices everywhere will be closed all day and there will be no deliveries.

While few incoming packages have yet been received here, the mailing out of Christmas parcels for distant points is increasing daily, and by Friday such mailings will be at its peak.

Postmaster Warner and staff have surplus mail bags and equipment in readiness for the rush of mailing out Christmas parcels, and caution that if such parcels are not mailed by Saturday night but are mailed Monday instead, they have a "fat chance" of ever being delivered on Christmas day, as there will then be only six days for the parcels to cross the continent, be assured and delivered before midnight on Christmas eve, if no hitch on route are encountered.

The local post office staff, with its extra help in ready both to send out and deliver, and only asks that the public co-operate.

Christmas parcels for southern California and like distances in other adjoining states should be mailed not later than next Wednesday in order to be sure of being delivered before Christmas day.

EGGS TAKE DROP, POULTRY STEADY PORTLAND TODAY

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 11.—(AP) Eggs have taken another drop on all classes except under-sized on the local market. Fresh standard extras were 42 cents, standard firsts 40 cents, medium extras 37 cents and medium firsts 36 cents today.

Only one change is evident in butter quotations. Butter standards dropped from 43 to 38 cents. The poultry market remains about steady with slightly higher prices of No. 1 dressed turkeys quoted at 32 to 34 cents a pound.

Cabbage, cauliflower and California green peppers were firmer on the local market today. Cabbage is quoted at 3 cents a pound, cauliflower \$1.25 to \$1.75 a crate, green peppers were offered at 20 to 25 cents a pound.

Apples, citrus fruits and grapes remain steady. No change in potatoes and onions.

The cranberry market continues strong with western variety as high as \$20 a barrel in chestnut barrel crates. Eastern cranberries are up to \$23 a barrel.
