

TOWN OF LINCOLN ASSUMING ASPECT NEW COMMUNITY

ASHLAND, Dec. 11.—(Special)—The town of Lincoln which is being built between Ashland and Klamath Falls in preparation for a big lumbering plant, is growing gradually into a well ordered community. About 30 men are at present engaged on construction work. Already a number of buildings have been completed, among them the store and hotel. It is expected that the mill structure will be completed in time for the opening of the summer work. J. H. Henry, a southern California capitalist, is the promoter of the new townsite.

Ten initiates were conducted into the mysteries of the Shrine on Friday night, when about 200 members of Hillah Temple gathered at the Masonic temple from all points of southern Oregon.
