TEN MAN TEAM IS HEYDLER'S DIAMOND PLAN

National League Head Suggests Pitchers Do No Batting — Tenth Player Would Hit and Run Bases for Hurler.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—(AP)—National League officials are in favor of 10-men baseball teams and pitchers who are just that and nothing more. What's more they will take their plan to the American League tomorrow.

John A. Heydler, just re-elected as president of the National League for four more years, suggested a radical change in the rules whereby weak-hitting pitchers would have somebody else to do their batting and base-running for them. While his club owners inclined a favorable ear, Mr. Heydler explained that he felt the rule change would speed up baseball and at the same time, obviate the necessity of having so many pinch hitters.

Mr. Heydler pointed out that the rule need not be compulsory so that good hitting pitchers could be permitted to take their regular turn at bat if managers so desired.

Provided the suggestion meets with American League favor it is possible that a special meeting of the rules committee would be called in time to place the suggested change in effect before the 1929 season starts.

The officials may look with favor upon the plan, but it is scarcely likely that the pitchers themselves will do very much toward cheering over it. Under modern heavy artillery conditions, pitchers usually are confronted with eight good batsmen anyway without making it worse by adding still another. The sight of a rival pitcher coming to the plate gives hurlers one of their few opportunities for rejoicing.

Mr. Heydler's radical suggestion was the topic of an otherwise routine meeting of the National League.

EAST TO RELY ON SIMPLE FOOTBALL IN CHARITY GAME

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 12.—(AP)—The eastern team will rely only on straight football to upset the west in the annual charity football game at San Francisco, December 29. As sociates Coaches Dick Hanley of Northwestern and Andy Kerr of Washington and Jefferson have announced.

The eastern squad, composed of 22 players from the east and middle west, will assemble at Northwestern university Saturday and after a three-hour drill will entrain for the west. Nothing but old time flying wedge plays, mass formations and plenty of kicking will comprise its attack, the coaches said.

Three days will be spent in San Francisco for training after which the eastern squad will be taken to Stanford university for its final workouts.

The west has won all three games played in the east-west series.

TROJANS TO MEET TECH NEXT YEAR

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12.—(AP)—The University of Southern California's football team will meet Carnegie Tech here on December 14, 1929, said a telegram from Gwynn Wilson, Trojan general manager, received by Arnold Eddy, graduate manager late last night. Wilson wired from New York. The game with the Skibos rounds out the Trojans' expansive program for next season. The scheduling of the Carnegie Tech game here was considered necessary by the Trojan management because of three big games away from home next year—Stanford, Washington and Notre Dame.

CHEROKEE INDIAN TO WRESTLE HERE WITH M. NORBECK

A full blood Cherokee Indian and a 100 per cent man is Bob Evans, who arrived in Medford yesterday from Oklahoma, where he was formerly the amateur wrestling champion of the state, to make his headquarters in this city for a match with Moose Norbeck, Pacific northwest champion, here a week from next Friday. Evans weighs 220 pounds and is also a former Oklahoma football and baseball player.

Having beaten everything that came his way in Oklahoma and Texas, Evans, who knew Sailor Jack Wood of this city years ago, is invading Oregon in the expectation that he will be accorded a series of victories in this section. For three years, while on the football squad, he was an all-state fullback, and up until entering professional ranks four years ago, he was a wrestler of amateur standing. He played baseball with the Western Association at Drumright, Okla., and was as good in baseball as he is now at wrestling.

WEBFOOTS WISH INTERSECTIONAL TURKEY DAY TILT

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 12.—(AP)—Permission for the University of Oregon to hold an intersectional game either in Eugene or Portland next Thanksgiving or the Saturday following, was given here today by Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the university, after a conference with Jack Benefiel, graduate manager. Oregon plays her final conference game next season, November 16, thus leaving the schedule open for a game with an outside team. Benefiel telegraphed Joe McKeown, student body president, who is now in the east attending a student conference, to get in touch with as many prospective opponents as possible. Mr. Benefiel has also started negotiations with several middle west and east-west teams.

BASEBALL'S BAD BOYS WORK FOR NEW CLUBS DURING NEXT SEASON

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Trade winds have blown Jess Petty into a Pirate uniform in the same gale that deposited Glenn Wright, late of Pittsburgh, in Brooklyn.

Wright, one of the greatest shortstops in the majors two years ago, will do his batting and fielding for Uncle Willbert Robinson at Elberts field next summer, while Petty is pitching his left-handed slants for the Pittsburgh Pirates. This trade, completed yesterday, sent Harry Rendon, utility infielder, to the Pirates along with Petty.

Wright and Petty both have been classed among the "bad boys" of baseball. Wright played a good share of the 1927 season on the Pirate bench, while young Dick Bartell exorted at shortstop. Petty, long disgruntled at Brooklyn, was suspended at the height of the last season for breaking training.

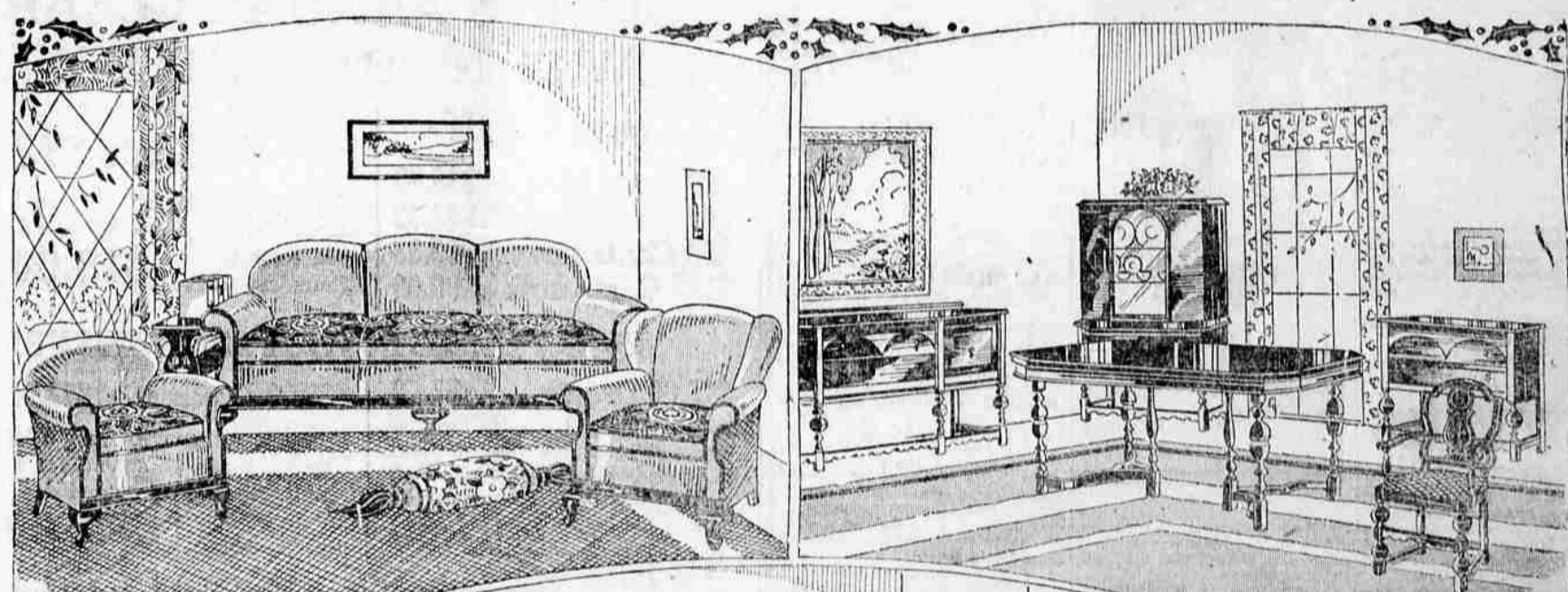
