The first Oregon Smith-Hughes agricultural instruction's sectional conference was held in Roseburg, Friday and Saturday, December 7 and 8.

The following program was presented: "Sectional Judging Contest"—Earl Cooley, Myrtle Point.

"Future Farmers of Oregon"—O. K. Heals, Coquille.

"Projects"—Prof. H. R. Gibson, O. S. C., Corvallis.

"Part Time and Evening Schools"—Wm. Averill, Cottage Grove.

"Annual Progress of Work"—O. D. Thompson, Medford.

"Discussion and Questions"—O. L. Paulson, Salem.

Saturday afternoon, under the supervision of Homer W. Crow, agricultural instructor in Roseburg senior high school, the instructors inspected the projects of Gaylord Bradford, William Burt and Harley Schaeffer, comprising poultry, dairy and sheep, respectively.

The conference was held in the Roseburg senior high school under the direction of O. T. Paulson of Salem, state supervisor of agricultural education, and Prof. H. H. Gibson of O. S. C., professor of agricultural education.

Others present besides those on the program were Mr. Knox of Coos River and J. R. Edwards of Grants Pass.
