The Boy Scouts held their regular meeting last Saturday evening. As a year of scout service was at an end they spent the evening electing officers and selecting committeemen.



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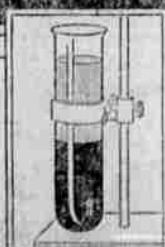

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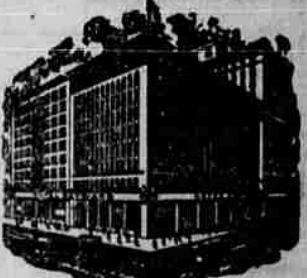
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
