"Ditching with dynamite" is a labor-saving and time-saving way of blasting ditches on timber land where the ground is very wet or where the amount of work is too small to justify using a machine. The most economical size of ditcher blast is one about three feet deep and six feet wide on top, since in larger and deeper ditches less dirt is thrown out per pound of powder used. For a three-foot ditch a pound of dynamite will throw out about a cubic yard of earth.

Don't throw away tails or small tubs that have holes in the bottom; they are good containers for use in sprouting oats to supply green feed for poultry in winter. Layers should be given a daily supply of sprouted oats.
