

NEW RADIO MOVIE DEVICE SENDS IMAGES WITHOUT SIZE LIMIT

PARIS—(AP) A device for the transmission of moving pictures by radio, in which the size of the image transmitted is not limited, has been developed by a Luxembourg scientist living near Paris.

While the transmission and reproduction of films by wireless has been accomplished by various methods, the inherent limitations of previous experiments have prevented them from attaining commercial importance.

Another advantage is that the use of a positive film is eliminated the transmission being accomplished by using the negative film direct.

The conservation of the intermediate magnetic impression being more or less indefinite, the wireless transmission of the picture can be repeated without further recourse to the original negative film.

GIVE THE HOUSE A CHRISTMAS PRESENT

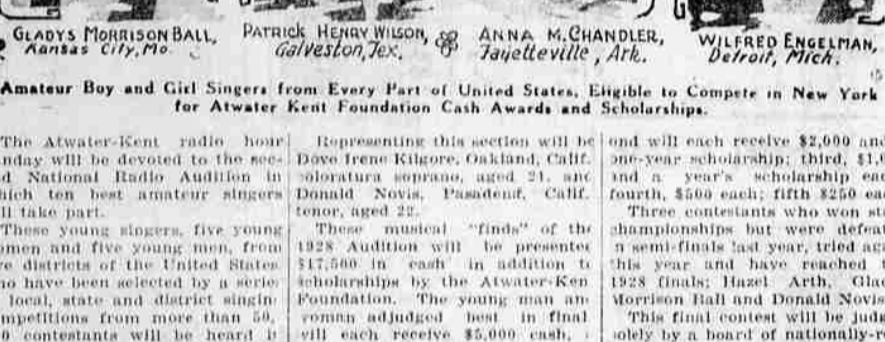
It Needs and Wants Things as Much as Do Those Who Live in It.

Amateur Boy and Girl Singers from Every Part of United States, Eligible to Compete in New York for Atwater Kent Foundation Cash Awards and Scholarships.

The Atwater-Kent radio hour Sunday will be devoted to the second National Radio Audition in which ten best amateur singers will take part.

These young singers, five young women and five young men, from five districts of the United States who have been selected by a series of local, state and district singing competitions from more than 50,000 contestants will be heard in finals of the Audition, beginning at 9:15 p. m., eastern standard time on Dec. 15.

Representing this section will be Dove Irene Kilgore, Oakland, Calif., soprano, aged 21, and Donald Novis, Pasadena, Calif., tenor, aged 22.

These musical "finds" of the 1928 Audition will be presented to \$17,500 in cash in addition to scholarships by the Atwater-Kent Foundation. The young man whom an adjudged best in final will each receive \$5,000 cash, and decoration and a two year scholarship at a leading American conservatory.

Three contestants who won state championships but were defeated in semi-finals last year, tried again this year and have reached the 1928 finals: Hazel Arth, Gladys Morrison Ball and Donald Novis.

This final contest will be judged solely by a board of nationally-recognized musical authorities appointed by the National Radio Audition Sponsorship Committee.

CINCINNATI, O.—From girls with pretty faces, Lord God de-


