OLD OREGON HAS ATTRACTION FOR MANY GRID MEN

Many of the members of the Medford high school football team, state champions, who graduate this year, when, and if they go to college, will attend the University of Oregon, unless they change their minds, between now and next September. Bernie Hughes, admittedly, even in The Dalles, as the most promising high school center in the state, and his brother, Jack, are both slated for Eugene, and both plan on turning out with the freshman football squad next fall. The daily parcels train, which runs as the second section of No. 1, and is due in Medford about 10:40, today was so heavily laden with its Christmas presents coming from all parts of the country that word reached the postoffice late this forenoon that it would not reach Medford before 3 o'clock this afternoon. So far the postoffice personnel of employees has been able to practically keep abreast with the incoming parcels by delivering them throughout the city within a few hours after they arrive by train.
