## "PUSH OVER" IS TOO GOOD FOR JOEY SANGOR

### Santiago Socks Sangor Silly in Second—Tom Loughran Given Decision Over Peterson—Callahan Put Down By Ted Ross.

CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—(AP)—A 20-year-old Cuban youth named Jose Armando, fighting under the warlike nom de plume of Armando Santiago, today became the foremost contender of the world's junior lightweight championship as a result of his surprising two-round knockout victory over Joey Sangor of Milwaukee, last night.

Sangor, hitherto regarded as the outstanding contender for the 130-pound title, was smashed to defeat in a spectacular battle that stumped the 10,000 spectators who filled the Coliseum. The freckled faced Milwaukee boy had accepted the match merely as a warm-up for his championship encounter with Ted Morgan of Seattle, the titleholder, in Milwaukee on New Year's day.

Instead of finding Santiago a push-over, Sangor met a two-fisted fighter who traded punch for punch. By his spectacular knockout victory Santiago joined the illustrious uprising that resulted in the

elevation of Ray Miller, the conqueror of Jimmy McLarnin, James J. Braddock, who vanquished Tuffy Griffith, and K. O. Christner, who polished off Knute Hansen with a knockout.

Santiago finished Sangor like he was an ordinary ham and eggs, instead of a contender for a championship. After a bristling first round in which they traded punches like two longshoremen, Sangor came out confidently for the second.

Within the twinkling of an eye he was groggy and reeling from a sharp right-cross to the chin. Santiago nailed him flush on the point of the jaw with a short right that knocked him silly. Sangor attempted to grab his opponent, but the Cuban wrestled him off and cracked him with another right. Sangor dropped to the floor for the count of nine.

**Knees Sag.**

As he struggled to his feet his face was ashen white and his knees were sagging. Santiago, boxing calmly and with deliberation, let fly with another right that knocked Sangor half way across the ring, where he sprawled flat on his face. He tried to get up on instinct alone. He managed to get himself up to one knee, then slumped back to the floor, the victim of the fatal ten count.

The upset of Sangor was the feature of the revival of boxing at the Coliseum, which also witnessed the victory of Tommy Loughran, Philadelphia, world's light heavyweight champion, scored over "Big Boy" Peterson of Minneapolis. Loughran, bidding for fame as a heavyweight championship contender, decisively beat his heavier and taller opponent in 10 rounds, spotting him 17½ pounds in weight.

Loughran had the margin in eight of the ten rounds by his masterful boxing. In the third round he was forced to retreat because of blood that trickled into his eye. Peterson fought a courageous fight, always hanging away with his right, but with Loughran dominating the fight.

Another upset was the defeat of Shuffie Callahan, the slugging, southpaw middleweight, who was forced to surrender to Ted Ross of Chicago in the seventh round, after hitting the canvas six times.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Kid Chocolate, flashy little Cuban negro who has been cutting a wide swath through the ranks of the lower bantamweights, has overcome the biggest obstacle encountered so far along his route to the top, Emil Paluso of Salt Lake City.

The Kid gave Paluso a terrific beating through eight rounds of their bout last night, winning on a technical knockout when the referee decided Paluso no longer could defend himself, and stopped the slaughter. Paluso showed only one flash of good form in the fourth when he got in close and slowed the Cuban up temporarily with a few hard body smashes.

## MASTERS OF CUE REPULSE ATTACK TITLE ASPIRANTS

CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Ralph Greenleaf of New York, world's pocket billiard champion, and Johnny Layton of Sedalia, Mo., the titan-haired king of the three-cushion artists, have turned back the first four attacks to dislodge them from their thrones.

Playing masterful billiards, the two champions came through their first matches in the two round robin tournaments at Orchestra hall last night with victories. Greenleaf triumphed over Pasquale Natale of Baltimore, 125 to 114 in 36 innings, while Layton edged out the veteran Gus Capulus of Detroit, 50 to 48 in 47 innings of spectacular shot-making.

The two men, who are recognized as their greatest threats, came through, however. They were Frank Tateski of Schenectady, N. Y., who defeated Ervin Rudolph of Chicago, 125 to 114, in the pocket billiard match, and the always spectacular Willie Hoppe of New York, who beat the former champion, Otto Reisel of Philadelphia, 50 to 35.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 18.—(AP)—Lewie (Hip) Dickerson, assistant freshman football coach, and former Star tackle of the Oregon State team, was weaker today with rising temperature and some delirium. Dickerson was stabbed in a lung early yesterday in a fight with Lance Bryant, local youth, jealous over Dickerson's attention to a Corvallis waitress.

Dickerson is a senior student, formerly of Weiser, Idaho. Bryant was held on an open charge, which officers said would be changed to murder in case the victim dies.

## SONNENBERG WILL TRY LEWIS AGAIN

BOSTON, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Gus Sonnenberg, former Dartmouth football player, has agreed to wrestle Ed (Strangler) Lewis again for the heavyweight championship in the Boston Garden on January 4.

Several months ago the pair met here and Sonnenberg gained the first fall with a "fling tackle" hold. Lewis was in distress when they faced off for the second time, but saved his title when Sonnenberg dove through the ropes, injuring himself so severely that he was unable to continue.

Lewis has received \$29,000 for signing the agreement and has been promised \$30,000 more on the night of the match. Sonnenberg will receive 12½ per cent of the receipts.

## GAY LIGHTS TO TWINKLE SOON FOR CONTEST

Only a few more days before the click of many switches all over the city will transform into fairylands of light the lawns and homes of many of our people. Thousands of tiny little colored lights will wink and blink their message of good cheer to all who pass by.

Almost everybody seems to have their own very definite ideas as to how they are going to decorate their particular domicile—or if they haven't any definite ideas when they start they collect them very quickly once they have acquired a few strings of Christmas bulbs.

For the benefit of those who are even yet a bit hazy as to just how they will proceed to secure one of the Chamber of Commerce prizes for the most artistically illuminated homes, here are a few suggestions as to ways in which very attractive effects may be gained.

1. Substitute a red lamp for the customary one in your entrance fixture and put a wreath around it.
2. Place electric candles in the Christmas wreaths in your windows. Electric candles are far safer than the wax variety.
3. Run colored lights through the trees and shrubbery on your grounds.
4. Place Christmas trees in tubs in the yard and trim them with strings of colored lights.
5. Run strings of colored lights along your veranda.
6. Fasten strings of colored lights along the eaves of your house.
7. Place colored lights in your flower boxes.
8. Twine colored lights in wreaths or garlands and hang them in the windows or festoon them about the outside of the house.
9. Place illuminated stars over the doors or on the roof of your house.
10. Illuminate your Christmas trees, both those used indoors and those in the yard, with strings of tiny electric lights.
11. Place colored lights, one red and one green, in twin sockets and place them in the windows.
12. Hang illuminated Christmas bells in the entry or in the windows.

With these hints as to ways in which to achieve an effective lighting display you can go ahead and work out your own individual display. You may, of course, use any or all of the above suggestions if you wish. Displays need not be elaborate to win a prize as simplicity and effectiveness will be carefully considered by the judging committee.
