

KELLOGG PACT IS POSTPONED BY SEN. BORAH

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Postponement of consideration of the Kellogg anti-war treaty reported Wednesday to the senate, until after the Christmas recess had been decided upon by Senator Borah, in charge of the treaty fight, after consulting with leaders.

The resolution of Senator Moses, which he would have accompanied the ratification of the treaty as "a clarifying statement of America's position," was modified today by its sponsors and the direct reference to the American Monroe doctrine was eliminated.

In its final form the Moses resolution reads:

"Resolved, That the senate of the United States declares that in advising and consenting to the multilateral treaty it does so with the understanding:

"1.—That the treaty does not impair or abridge the right of the United States to defend its territory or other vital interests in accordance with the traditional American policies.

"2.—That the treaty imposes no obligation on the United States to resort to coercive or punitive measures against any offending nation.

"3.—That the treaty does not obligate the United States to which the conditions of any treaty to which the United States is not a party.

"4.—That the secretary of state is requested to forward a copy of this resolution to the representatives of other powers."

Corporation Commissioner Friedlander has granted a permit to the Los Angeles Monkey Farms, Inc., to sell stock and to conduct a business of breeding, selling, renting and exhibiting monkeys. It is the plan of the company to center its monkey business in Culver City.

HUNGARIAN PIANIST, BARRED BY AMERICA, JUMPS FROM LINER TO BE HELD IN SPRING ON WEST NOMINATION

CHERBOURG, France, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Jadva Kerecsy, a young Hungarian pianist, jumped from the decks of the liner Deutschland and was drowned. It was learned today when the vessel arrived here from New York. Passengers said that the girl had been barred by quota laws from remaining in the United States and marrying her fiancé. They believed that this caused her to commit suicide.

The girl was returning to Hamburg after being permitted to stay in the United States for six months as a visitor. After dinner on Tuesday night, she darted across the promenade deck and leaped into the sea. The night was dark and although a small boat cruised about for an hour, her body was not recovered.

NATIONAL CONTEST FOR LANDS COMMITTEE IS HI SCHOOL ORCHESTRAS GIVEN ADVERSE REPORT TO BE HELD IN SPRING ON WEST NOMINATION

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—(AP)—A national contest for high school orchestras has been announced by C. M. Tremaine, director of the national bureau for the advancement of music.

State contests will be held, the winners in two classes to compete at Iowa City, Iowa, May 17 and 18 for trophies awarded by the national bureau. Mr. Tremaine said the contest will be the first of its kind ever held.

The date of the contest was set so as not to interfere with the national band concert, which is to be held in Denver May 23-25, as some students are members of their school band and school orchestra.

Governor Dies
VICTORIA, B. C., Dec. 20.—(AP)—Walter C. Nichol, former lieutenant governor of British Columbia and former publisher of the Vancouver Daily Province, is dead here following an operation.

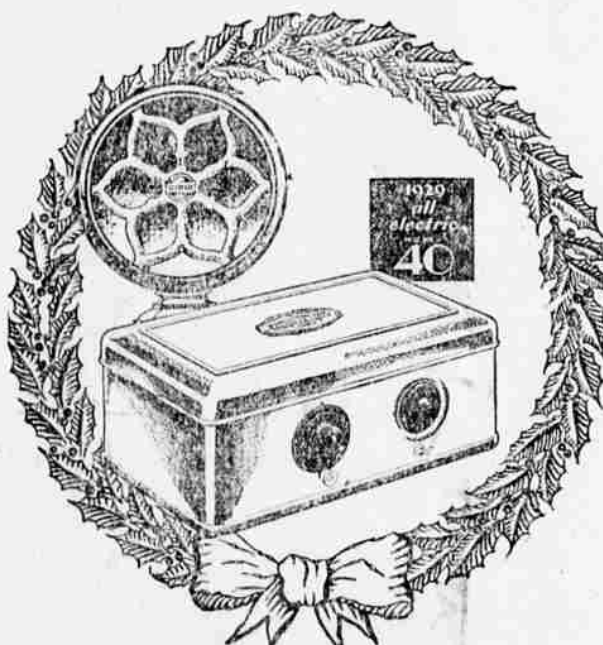

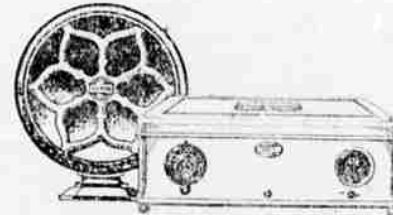
