alcohol to prevent them disposing of the alcohol to bootleggers thru "cover houses" is urged in the mills plan.

Respect for Law.

Young Almack stressed the need for knowledge of the law, respect for the law, and able administration of the law.

Under the first heading, he pointed out the need to acquaint citizens with provisions of the state and federal prohibition laws, and suggested that enforcement chiefs could have both statutes printed in a little booklet, and broadcast by radio.

To increase respect for these laws, the boy suggested teaching the history of the prohibition movement and the evils of the liquor traffic. He also urged education to the effect that prohibition is a sound economic policy and that loyalty to the law is needed.

In regard to administration of the law, Almack urged that a prohibition director who is a real leader, be appointed, and that his assistants be young men and women of good character. Among the assistants, the boy urged, should be a director of research, a director of education, and a director of enforcement.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—(AP)—The prohibition enforcement plan put forward by Chester P. Mills of New York to win the Durant \$25,000 prize is not worth nearly that much, in the opinion of Prohibition Commissioner Devin.

The commissioner said today that Mills' proposal does not deal with present day problems and that suppression of the diversion of industrial alcohol, treated in the Mills plan, had been accomplished a year and a half ago.

The same feature was described by F. Scott McBride, general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league, as only a detail of the whole problem, but nevertheless important enough to warrant close attention. He added, however, that the government was succeeding in decreasing the diversion of industrial alcohol to bootleg channels. McBride agreed with Mills' statement that prohibition enforcement "should be taken out of politics."

WOOD CHALLENGES 'TERRIBLE DANE' TO EARLY MATCH

WEBFOOTS TOO FAST IN GAME WITH HONOLULU

Oregon Wins, 13 to 2 Victory in Wind and Rain—Blocked Punt Nets Island Eleven Only Marker—Gale Prevents Kicking.

HONOLULU, Dec. 25.—(AP)—Oregon University's varsity football team won a 13 to 2 victory over the Honolulu team here on Christmas day in a game featured by a wind and rain storm, making it necessary to hold the ball during the huddles to prevent it being blown away. The Oregonians were too fast for the Honolulu squad and prevented them from scoring a touchdown, despite the fact the ball was in Oregon territory a good share of the time.

Johnny Kitzmiller, Oregon's "flying Dutchman," attempted a field goal in the first quarter, only to have the wind halt the ball before it reached the goal posts. During the second period Gould went over for Oregon's first touchdown. The try for extra point failed.

In the final period Burnell went over for Oregon's second touchdown. The try for extra point was successful when a short pass, Kitzmiller to Robinson, was completed over the goal line. The team's only scoring came in this period when one of Kitzmiller's punts was blocked and the Islanders scored a safety for two points. About 4000 braved the elements to witness the game.

ATHLETES COMPARED WITH HARVARD GRINDS

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Dec. 26.—(AP)—Athletes as students are compared with non-athletes in a survey by Assistant Professor Donald Snedden of the Harvard graduate school of education.

The results of the survey, contained in the current Alumni Bulletin indicate that of the 804 members of the class of 1927, there were 361 athletes and 343 non-athletes, but that 81 per cent of the athletes received their degrees compared with 68 per cent of the non-athletes. In addition, the athletes took an average of 4.61 semesters to complete their work while the non-athletes required 5.67.

BASQUE AXMAN BEATS RENAULT IN HOT BATTLE

Decision Gained Over Ten Round Route—Canadian On Defensive Throughout—K. O. Near in Final Frame.

CALL, Colombia, Dec. 26.—(AP)—Paulino Uzcudun of Spain, the favorite heavyweight of all Spanish-speaking people, has earned himself a place in the hearts of South American ring fans. In a 10-round battle, hailed as the greatest fight ever held in Latin-America, Paulino decisively outpointed Jack Renault of Canada here yesterday to get a well-earned decision.

Renault fought a defensive battle all the way and gained the ring-side by his success in blocking Paulino's fierce left hooks. In the fifth and sixth rounds he staged short rallies, carrying the fight to each draws for the two frames. One hard blow drew blood from the Spaniard's nose in the sixth round and slowed his attack temporarily. Another brief rally came in the ninth round.

A crowd of more than 20,000 hailed the decision.
