CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 27.—(Special.)—The don't all wash dishes. Joe College is becoming more versatile each year in earning his way from room to room.

College statistics for a number of years show that approximately 21 per cent of the men and 20 per cent of the women are readily self-supporting. In addition, 25 per cent more of the entire student body are partly so.

George Hartley, 16-year-old freshman, who says he will not be satisfied until he finishes his undergraduate work and then goes on for a doctor's degree in law, works in a Corvallis barber shop in his spare hours and then plays the drums in a campus orchestra on week-end nights.

James B. and Robert Brown brought a pair of cows to collect with them and started producing and selling certified milk. At the start they performed all the duties from milking to business solicitors, but their dairy has expanded to such an extent that they now hire extra students help.

As representative of a shoe company, Sterling DeBakey, another Portland student, carries his sample case around to the various fraternities and halls, taking orders for collegiate footwear. Fraternity men are naturally hospitable, he finds, so he accumulates many a free meal in addition to the business. From these two sources of income DeBakey is making his entire college expenses.

And so it goes. One student runs a popcorn stand. Another takes orders for a local photographer, others sell clothing, operate home photo finishing shops, or do a bit of tutoring on the side. They don't all wash dishes!

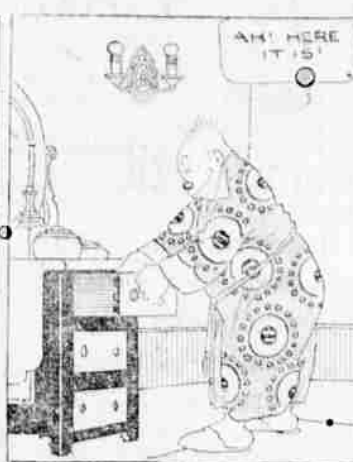
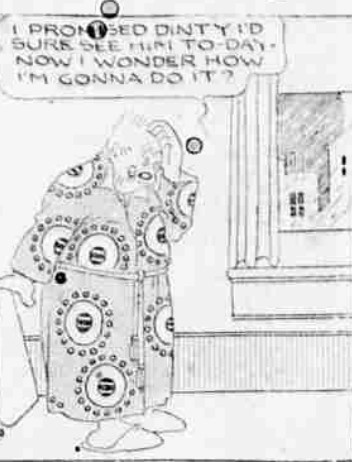

EGGS FALL AGAIN PORTLAND MARKET

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 27.—(AP) Egg prices came tumbling again on the local market after the varied fluctuations of the last week. Fresh standard extras were 35 cents today, standard firsts, 36; medium extras, 34 1/2, and medium firsts, 33 cents. Only one slight adjustment in butter prices brought standards to 45 1/2 cents.

Poultry and country meats were steady. Seasonable apples on the market include Delicious, Golden Delicious, Rome Beauties, Cortley, Spitzenbergs and Yellow Newtowns. Extra fancy varieties sold for \$2 to \$2.50, mostly \$2.20. Fancy, \$1 to \$1.75, according to size, variety and fill.

New York. NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—(AP) High money rates again blocked the path of speculators for the advance in today's stock market. Call money advanced from 10 1/2 to 11 1/2 cent as banks called \$25,000,000 in loans. Little new money came into the market from interior banks and a further stiffening in rates is expected before tomorrow afternoon.

General electric again was the star performer, touching 212, a new high record, as the tension in the money market failed to halt the late upward in prices. Much of the day's early losses were cancelled. National Tea shot up 15 points, Safeway Stores, which was listed today and opened at 171, advanced to 179. There was heavy accumulation of some oil and rubber stocks, American Can, St. Joseph Lead and Johns Manville issues. The closing was firm. Sales approximated \$3,500,000 shares.

Negro Hanged. HATTIESBURG, Miss., Dec. 27.—(AP) The body of Emanuel McClinton, negro automobile mechanic, was found dangling from a tree limb today near the Richburg Hill gravel pit. A coroner's jury returned a verdict of death by "hands unknown" and no arrest has been made.

CICERO MAYOR IS SAVED BY BOMB PROVING A 'DUD'

CHICAGO, Dec. 27.—(AP)—An attempt upon the lives of Mayor Joseph Kenna of Cicero, his wife and their two children, failed yesterday when the fuse attached to 12 sticks of dynamite scattered out within an inch of the explosion.

Had it exploded, police said, the Kenna home, and perhaps others in the block, would have been wrecked.

An extensive investigation was started, but only a few details were made public. Officers believed the plot to assassinate the mayor of the Chicago suburb was rooted in disagreement that resulted over certain municipal affairs, which they did not explain.

Edward Carmody, city attorney, recalled that one of the parties to a recent city hall transaction, believing himself wronged, had threatened Kenna "and his whole family."

Antiques Stolen. CLEVELAND, Ohio, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Antiques valued at \$25,000 were stolen from the shop of Judas Ratzowski, police learned today. In the loot were several eighteenth century tapestries, one of which Ratzowski valued at \$8000, religious ivories of the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries, statues of Emperor Napoleon and his wife, and jewel cases which formerly belonged to Europe's royalty.
