HOPPE BALKS AT QUALIFYING PLAY BILLIARD BATTLE

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—(AP)—For the first time in more than 20 years, Willie Hoppe, many times holder of the title, will not take part in the world's 18.2 ball game billiards championship tournament starting here February 4. Officials of the National Billiard association, sponsors of the tournament, gave him his choice between playing in the 18.2 championship or the three cushion tournament, in which he won second place at Chicago. "Inasmuch as I had qualified for the three-cushion tournament I saw no reason to withdraw in favor of ballgame," Hoppe said. "This will be the first major ballgame tournament I have missed since 1906. I still think the playing of three cushions has not impaired my ballgame, but evidently the officials are of the impression that a player cannot be efficient at both styles."
