STATE BONDS REDUCED TO \$27,500,000 NOW

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 29. - (AP) - State Treasurer Kuy said today that the state is depositing with its fiscal agency in New York \$27,500,000 to pay principal and interest in Oregon veterans' state aid bonds due January 1. This will reduce outstanding veterans' aid bonds to \$27,500,000, the total amount issued was \$29,000,000.

On April 1 the state will reduce the highway debt to \$21,854,250. The original issue of highway bonds was \$28,700,000.

DR. ROBT. MILLIKAN TO HEAD SCIENTISTS

NEW YORK, Dec. 29. - (AP) - Election of Dr. Robert Andrews Millikan, California physicist, as president of the American Association for the Advancement of Science for 1929, was announced today. Dr. Millikan is one of three Americans to win a Nobel prize. He got the physics award in 1926.

His recent work has been in developing his theory of the cosmic rays which holds that matter is still being created by the elementary forces found in space.

OFFICERS CAPTURE ALLEGED RUNNERS AND BIG CARGOES

Two alleged house runners, William Brown of Eagle Point and E. A. George of North Bend, were arrested last night and this forenoon by officers at Ashland and were scheduled to have hearings today. Over 30 gallons of alcohol and 50 gallons of moonshine, valued at \$2000, were confiscated and two automobiles, valued at \$2500, were seized, making one of the largest hauls made by officers in Jackson county in 12 hours during 1928.

George was apprehended last night by Policemen Prescott and Moun of Ashland and was not arrested until he had attempted to elude the officers by speeding away when he was ordered to stop when in the Ashland city limits. He was taken in custody near the Jackson Hot Springs. His car, according to the officers, was filled with 10 five-gallon tin containers filled with moonshine, presumably a northern California product.

Brown was stopped in Ashland at 12:30 this forenoon by Traffic Officers C. P. Talent and Herb Moore, whose suspicions were aroused by several tin cans they saw in the rear of the car and the fact that the machine was heavily loaded. Brown did not attempt to escape, and claimed he had just borrowed the car for a few days and did not know what was contained in the cans. Brown's car, a Studebaker Commander, was registered to E. M. McDonald of California.

Both cases were turned over to Federal Prohibition Agent Terry Talent who will file the complaints against the men.

DECEMBER COURT BUSINESS SLACK 19 CASES HEARD

The city court business for the month of December, both in cases heard and fines imposed and collected, was very light, but doubtless would have been heavier had not Judge Taylor left the city a few days before Christmas to be gone three weeks, since which time the court has been closed.

The total for the month, up to the time of his departure, was 19 cases with fines paid amounting to \$139, which financial total was much less than for the previous month of November, where there were 13 cases with fines amounting to \$425.

Six of the nine cases for December were of intoxication arrests with fines of \$10 each, one was for liquor possession charge, with fine of \$50, one for breaking glass in the street with fine of \$10 and one for disturbing the peace, with fine of \$10.

According to the city court records the number of cases and amount of fines for the month of December the past four years were as follows: 1927, 17 cases, \$380; 1926, 19 cases, \$392; 1925, 15 cases, \$129; 1924, seven cases, \$40.

Of course, to be added to the total number of cases of last month, will be turned into the court the many \$1 fines or half money taken at the police station during the special campaign, begun about a week ago to enforce the one-hour car parking ordinance.
