

NEW CHEVROLETS TO BE DISPLAYED HERE TOMORROW

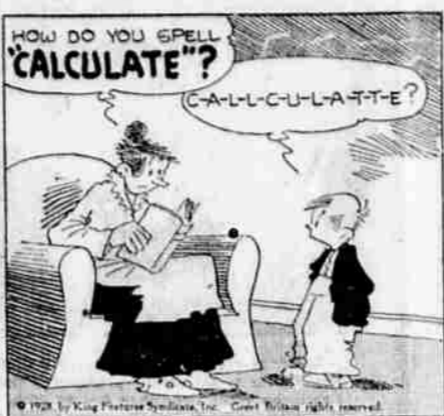

WASHINGTON.—Radio will enter the new year with a cloud of uncertainty hanging over the regulation of broadcasting.

Two important developments affecting governmental supervision of broadcasting stations are expected in January—action by congress on the continuation of the federal radio commission as an administrative body and decision by the court of appeals of the District of Columbia in the suit brought by WGY, the General Electric station at Schenectady, N. Y., against the commission.

With Senator Dill, of Washington, and Representative White, of Maine, authors of the radio act, and other leaders in radio legislation favoring a continuance of the commission in its present capacity, it is believed the life of the board will be extended for one year.
