DEFENSE SEEKING TESTIMONY FROM LIPS OF MOTHER

COURTROOM, RIVER SIDE, Cal. Jan. 3.—(AP)—An effort to obtain testimony of Mrs. Sarah Louisa Northcott, mother of Gordon Stewart Northcott, was made today by Norbert Savay, young Northcott's counsel.

In an affidavit presented in court in behalf of a motion that Mrs. Northcott be returned immediately from San Quentin prison, Savay deposed that he believed Mrs. Northcott to be in possession of information exonerating her son of the murders of Lewis and Nelson Winslow of Pomona.

The mother is able to testify, Savay asserted, as to the whereabouts of her son on the nights of February 1 and 2, 1928, when the crimes are alleged to have been committed, and could show that Gordon Stewart did not commit them.

A motion of defense counsel Norbert Savay for separate trials for Gordon Stewart Northcott in the "headless Mexican" murder and the Winslow brothers' slaying was denied by Judge George R. Freeman today.

Savay argued that the charges were not similar and that the alleged murders had been committed three months apart. Prosecution counsel argued, however, that no objection to the grouping of the charges had been made at the time of arraignment.

The defense counsel earlier had succeeded in obtaining recognition of an insanity angle in the case when he was granted a motion for a commission of experts to examine both Northcott and her physical evidence as may be presented.

MEXICO CITY HARD HIT BY INFLUENZA

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 3.—(AP)—A dispatch to El Universal today from Monterey stated that there were 25,000 cases of flu in the city, that 90 per cent of the school children were ill and that schools, theatres and all other public buildings had been closed.

In Mexico City health authorities said that the epidemic was diminishing, due to prompt measures for its control when it first appeared in the fall and the pentecostary.

Walker Assigned

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Chief Justice Coshaw of the supreme court has assigned Judge A. G. Walker of Yamhill county to hold court in Marion county in place of Judge L. H. McMahon who is disqualified in several cases pending here.

SALVATION ARMY LEADER TOLD OF DEPOSING PLANS

LONDON, Eng., Jan. 3.—(AP)—General Bramwell Louth, for 16 years head of the Salvation Army, has finally been told on his sick bed at Southwood that the high council has been called and that there is a movement to depose him.

It was a great shock to the aged general, who said: "Whatever people may think about the government of the army, they must feel this is rough on me."

Supporters of Evangeline Booth, American commander of the Salvation Army, believed today that she was assured the necessary three-quarters majority of the general council to effect the removal of General Booth as commander in chief. These votes would also enable her to carry out her program for the reorganization of the army.

It was understood that if Miss Booth should be elected to head the army she would probably affect its organization and then would retire.

Coshaw Chief Justice

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 3.—(AP)—By the seniority process O. P. Coshaw has succeeded John L. Rand as chief justice of the Oregon Supreme court, and will serve in that office for two years. The chief justiceship is determined, according to age and tenure in office.

CAVES ROAD WIDENING IS TO BE EXPEDITED

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 3.—(AP)—Work of widening the road leading to the Oregon Caves, near Grants Pass, will be urged this summer. \$20,000 to be spent by the state, \$10,000 by the federal government, it was announced today by the state highway commission.
