Mr. and Mrs. Roy Williams and children spent Sunday in Medford at the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Wilbur.

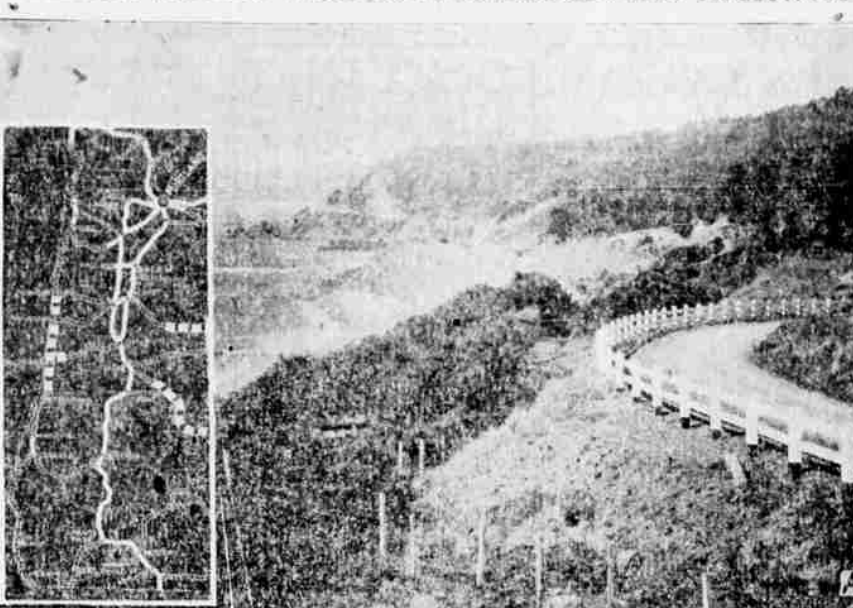
