BEAUCOHE, Miss., Jan. 4.—(AP)—A thin, gray line of veterans, tired and found true under union fire in the civil war, today was fighting an even pricier foe—Influenza—which had swept down upon the Jefferson Davis old Confederate soldiers' home here.

The disease, coupled with pneumonia, has claimed the lives of five inmates of the home since Wednesday noon. Twenty-five others are seriously ill and 108 of the old soldiers, their wives and widows are on the sick list.

Governor T. G. Hilbo today ordered his official and personal services to aid the aged veterans.
