MAURINE CARROLL IN CHARGE DEANS' SECTION AT MEET

The growing need for the office of dean of women in the high schools was one subject stressed at the Oregon State Teachers' association meeting held during the holidays in Portland, and at which more than 20 of the largest high schools of the state were represented.

Miss Maurine Carroll, dean of women at the local high school, which office was established here three years ago, was introduced to the association by the Portland president of the Parent-Teachers' council, and was placed in charge of the deans' section, in which capacity she served throughout the two-day convention.

Miss Maud Barriger, physical education instructor in the Medford schools, gave an interesting talk on the Health Program of the Medford Schools, and outlined the system of cooperation enjoyed here between the dean of women and the physical education department.
