

MYSTERY MAN TO BE RETURNED FOR CRIME SITE VIEW

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 8.—(AP)—J. C. Price, Montana mystery man, who claims he was kidnaped by three men at his ranch near Big Timber, Mont., and brought to Salt Lake, will be taken back to the scene of his disappearance 12 days ago by Sheriff Ed Brannan and County Attorney John N. McFarlane of Sweetgrass county tonight.

The Montana officers made another attempt today to shake Price's story and to secure a clue to the identity of a man who was evidently burned to death on the Price homestead the day he disappeared. The charred corpse found in the ruins of Price's ranch house was identified as the body of Price and was buried in Roseman, Mont.

RESCUED GORILLA TO ZOOLOGICAL GARDENS

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—(AP)—The Bronx zoo this spring will place on exhibition the only gorilla in a zoological garden in this country. The gorilla, 14 months old and weighing 21 pounds, is the gift of Dr. W. Reimold Wheeler of the Presbyterian board of missions. It was rescued from ill-treatment by natives in Belg Congo. The animal is now in a hospital suffering from scurvy and malnutrition.

WILLAMETTE GROCERS PERFECT HUGE MERGER

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 9.—(AP)—To 23 resources of about \$1,500,000 are represented in the merger yesterday of 125 retail grocery stores of the Willamette valley, which will be known as the United Fruit & Grocery Co. The operations of the chain are in Marion, Linn, Polk, Yamhill, Lincoln and Benton counties. The merger was brought about by the Willamette Grocery company, Theodore Roth, president, said that the chain will be allied for buying purposes with 450 stores in Washington.

OREGON SCHOOLS COST TWENTY-TWO MILLIONS

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 9.—(AP)—For the fiscal year ending June 18 next the public schools of Oregon expended \$22,000,000, says the biennial report of C. A. Howard, state superintendent of schools. The enrollment of pupils in the schools totals about 157,000 and about 8000 teachers are employed. Checks and school board members in the state number 9524. In buildings, grounds and equipment the schools represent an investment of \$30,000,000 says the report.

FIND EGYPTIAN TRACE IN REGION OF BRAZIL

RIO JANEIRO, Jan. 9.—(AP)—The newspaper A Noite today quoted Alfredo De Santos, a Portuguese naturalist, as saying that he had found evidence that Egyptian, Phoenician and Carthaginian civilizations existed in Brazil and other parts of South America 4,000 years ago. He has just returned to Rio Janeiro after spending four months in the little known interior regions.

ROYAL ROMANCE HINT IS REVIVED IN SOFIA

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Rumors that King Boris will marry Princess Giovanna of Italy have been revived in Sofia and it is now thought possible that the engagement will be announced formally soon after Jan. 30, the 35th birthday of the king. In this event it is believed that the marriage and subsequent coronation would be held some time after the celebrations of the 50th anniversary of the liberation of Bulgaria from Turkish rule and the 1600th anniversary of the reign of the ancient Bulgarian monarch, Simeon the Great, which will take place this year.

MAJOR COOLIDGE TO ESCORT GIRL INAUGURAL BALL

HARTFORD, Conn., Jan. 9.—(AP) Major John Coolidge tonight will escort his fiancée, Miss Florence Trumbull, to her father's inaugural ball. It will be the first time the major has worn his new uniform. Appointment of the president's son as a major on the staff of Governor John H. Trumbull was made possible by an agreement of the general assembly to amend the military law of the state today to permit appointment of a staff officer to represent the citizen military training camps. Coolidge, who is employed at the New Haven offices of the New York, New Haven & Hartford railway, has attended several of the citizen military camps during his summer vacation at Amherst college. Twenty years ago today Theodore Roosevelt, then a president's son, was appointed a colonel on the staff of Governor George L. Lilley. At that time, however, aides could be appointed from civilian life without special legislation. Major Coolidge will assist at the inauguration of his prospective father-in-law for a third term.

CHEWING WIFE'S NOSE COSTS INDIAN LIBERTY

SISSETON, S. D., Jan. 9.—(AP)—Amos White Sioux Indian, who bit off the end of his wife's nose so the Indian was less attractive to other Indian men, was sentenced to two years and eight months in the state penitentiary at Sioux Falls by Judge Babcock in circuit court here last night. He was charged with maintaining a nuisance.

Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—(AP)—The stock market, which had been on the down grade since the latter part of last week, turned upward today in reflection of the more cheerful feeling in Wall Street, regarding the credit situation. Fears of an immediate increase in the federal reserve discount rate have practically disappeared and the call money rate dropped from 7 to 6 per cent today on the arrival of a large supply of out of town funds seeking temporary investment. Rushing up of General Motors old stock on its last day of trading to 29 1/2, a rise of nearly 19 points, stamped the shorts in some of the speculative issues and a number of favorites exceeded their previous best figures of the day. Investment rails were bid up, Canadian Pacific 4 1/2 and Southern Railway 4 1/2 points. Auto stock fell back 4 points on announcement of change in control. The closing was strong. Sales approximated 4,000,000 shares.
