SLAYER CARRIES BODY OF VICTIM MILES IN AUTO. HARRISVILLE, Mo., Jan. 10.—(AP)—The body of Clay Branch, 33, farmer, was found buried in hay on the farm of Prentiss Fullard, 23, today after it had been carried in Fullard's car 30 miles over snow-covered roads from the scene of the slaying near Lone Jack, Mo.
