

BOSTON HEIRESS SEEKING DIVORCE FROM HER COUNT

PARIS, Jan. 10.—(AP) Countess Pierre de Jumilhac, the former Constance Coolidge, Boston heiress has applied for a divorce. The countess is one of the most prominent race horse owners in France and the count's family is one of the most notable in the French aristocracy. Details of the application have been kept secret. Mrs. Cecile Javquier Kerria, has been granted a divorce from John Joseph Kerria, on the grounds of abandonment. They were married in Chicago on June 19, 1926, and Mr. Kerria's address is given as 297 South Wabash avenue, Chicago.

Her marriage to De Jumilhac occurred in Paris on October 11, 1924.

BULL RUN WATER FOR THIRSTY LEGISLATORS

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 10.—(AP)—Members and attaches of the Oregon legislature this year will be furnished Bull Run water from Portland for drinking purposes. Secretary of State Hoss said today that he had arranged for the shipment of 20 gallons to Salem each day, the arrangement to continue through the session unless Salem water improves to a satisfactory degree. Containers will be placed in the senate chamber and the hall of representatives and in the restaurant in the basement of the state house.

WHALEN TO STOP NUDITY DISPLAYS IN NIGHT HAUNTS

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Night clubs and cabarets featuring revues of scantily clad girls have been proscribed by Police Commissioner Whalen.

He stated his policy as an answer to editorial criticism of his drive under which more than 900 liquor raids have been made and at least 20 places wrecked by "strong arm" squads for reopening after raids. The statement said: "I have noted the comment of some of my friends, the editorial writers. They are needlessly alarmed that I am going too fast. By their information let me again repeat the policy of the police commissioner: 'To maintain a speed in police activity that will keep the vicious criminals in jail where they belong, or keep them broke paying for lawyers and bondsmen. There will be no let-up in police activity against the crime-breeding speakeasy dispensing poison liquor.'"

"Every dive of this character will be put out of business and kept out of business." "This also applies to the so-called high class speakeasy restaurants and cabarets that parade nude women for the edification of their patrons."

IRRIGATION MAIN DEVELOPMENT IN APPROPRIATIONS

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 10.—(AP)—Irrigation, rather than power development has been the main purpose of water appropriation in Oregon during the last two years, says the biennial report of Rhea Luper, state engineer.

Of 1178 permits issued the reports show that these call for only 35,811 horsepower in power development, and that they allow water diversion for 157,809 acres. The largest permit was for the Oeyhee project which will irrigate about 127,000 acres at a cost of about \$18,000,000. The construction of 23 dams, storing 79,247 acre feet, is contemplated.

The report shows the progress of adjudication proceedings started before the state engineer on 16 river systems, and that water rights now being adjudicated include those on the John Day river, Walla Walla river, Cow Creek, Wood, Illinois and Innaha rivers, involving the rights of over 100,000 acres of land.

The report shows a steady development of water power during the last 20 years. In 1908 the total hydroelectric development in the state was only 70,000 horse power. In 1925 it had increased

to 175,000. In 1925 to 244,000 and in 1928 to 289,500. Under the present law the state engineer is required to approve all applications for permits to appropriate water when made in proper form. He recommends an amendment that will allow the state to deny applications for the construction of dams or the appropriation of water that will interfere with the highest development of water resources of unobscurely desirable fish life or the scenic or recreational value of the rivers.

LESS CONSTRUCTION REPORTED FOR 1928

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Permits for new construction in 1928 Pacific coast cities, as compiled by Straus and company totaled 117,645 for work to cost \$409,791,713 for 1928. This is a reduction of approximately 11 per cent from 1927.

Sixty-one California cities declared 13 per cent, nine Oregon cities 28 per cent, and two Arizona cities 9 per cent. These declines, with smaller ones in Utah and Idaho, were partly offset by gains in Washington and British Columbia.
