GOLFING ARMY SLASHED TO 90 BY FIRST TEST

200 Contestants Fall By Wayside in Qualifying Round for Los Angeles Open — Forty Exempt— Dan Williams Led Field.

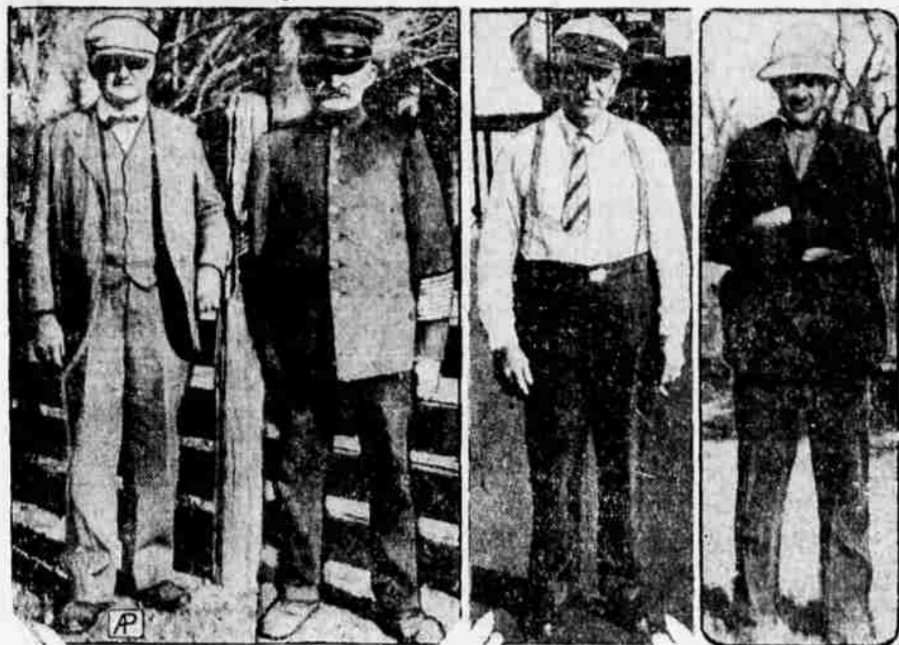

SANTA MONICA, Cal., Jan. 10.—(AP)—The nation's golfing pilgrims, 130 strong and survivors of a force that before dawn yesterday was some three times that number, sat tight in this port of par today as they rested and considered their chances in the impending \$10,000 Los Angeles open.

Thirty-six holes of qualifying play yesterday held over six courses, slashed a contesting field of 200 players, who with 40 others who were exempt from qualification because of their showing in the national open and last year's Los Angeles open, will start the "big money" drive on the Riviera Country club course, near here tomorrow. Eighteen holes of shooting will start the 72-hole grand under way. A similar number will follow on Saturday, with the low 64 scorers and ties for both days' play going into the 36-hole final drive Sunday.

Williams Leads.
With but one or two outstanding exceptions the 200 odd players who fell by the wayside in yesterday's qualifying round were lesser known of the realm of golf. Dan Williams, golfing professional from Shastanook, N. J., made it known he was one to be reckoned with in the Los Angeles open when he passed the preliminary test with flying colors, leading the field with 72-69-141. His card was one stroke better than that of Johnny Rodgers of Denver, Colo., who is acclaimed by many of his fellows as perhaps the greatest wood and iron shot in the country, when he is on his game, and John Junor of Portland, Rodgers blazed a 69 over the Sunset fields country club course in his morning round, and followed with a 73. Junor's golf was the more consistent, the Portland professional turning in a 71 for each of his trips. Frank Roda, of Seattle, turned in a 74-69-143 for the preliminary tests, while Johnny Golden, stocky Paterson, N. J., professional, had 74-72-144.

MacDonald Smith of the Lakeville country club, Great Neck, Long Island, was the defending titlist, and was not obliged to qualify.

BOB MEYERS AND AL KARASICK IN TWO HOUR DRAW

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 10.—(AP)—Bob Meyers, Tillamook, and Al Karasick, Portland, light-heavyweights, went through two hours of wrestling here last night to a draw. Each won a fall. Meyers took the first fall in 1 hour 15 minutes 32 seconds with a step-over short arm scissors. Six minutes before expiration of the two hour limit, Karasick touched his reverse headlock into play and after several applications of his belt hold, tumbled Meyers to the canvas with a flying headhold. The time for the fall was 28 minutes, 28 seconds. Both men weighed 172 pounds.

In the preliminary, Walter Johnson took one fall and the decision over Jim Thorpe.

LOCAL GAGE MEN MEET FIRST FOE FRIDAY EVENING

The Medford high school basketball squad will launch its campaign for the district championship Friday evening at Klamath Falls, with the high school of that city, in the first southern Oregon conference game for the locale. The squad, under the direction of Coach Frank Callison, held a hard practice this evening. The team will leave tomorrow afternoon for the Klamath county metropolis, and return after the game. Morgan, Bowman, McDonald, Melvin, Thomas and a string of substitutes will make the jump.

Saturday night, the locals play the annual game with the alumni, in the first game of the season for local fans. The alumni is a strong outfit, and is composed of former college and high school stars. The game will start at 9:00 o'clock to allow store employees to see the contest.

The following week-end the high school plays two games with the University of Oregon Freshman team of which Estill Phipps, last year's center, is a member. These will be two of the best and hardest games of the year, and a record crowd is expected to witness the contest.

The next week-end, the Medford team will play the Fresh at Eugene, and the Hooks at Corvallis, in their first invasion of the campuses in five years.

The Klamath Falls game is being regarded seriously by the locals, as last season, full of confidence, they barely managed to nose out the east of the Cascades outfit, in the opening game.

WOMAN BLINDED BY WHITE MULE AFTER A 'PARTY'

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Mrs. Thelma Sanford, 19, said to have been a former federal agent, lay in a hospital blind today, a victim of poison liquor.

Three men, John Lavender, Robert Kelly and Tom Meyer, locals, who said they drank "white mule" with them in Meyer's apartment Sunday had been questioned by police and released. They were searching for a bootlegger named Jack, who delivered the moonshine at the party. All four drank the liquor, police say and the men were not affected.

The girl's sister, Mrs. C. R. Burns of El Paso, Texas, who arrived here yesterday, said that she and Mrs. Sanford had been employed by the United States customs service in Texas and in Phoenix, Ariz., to detect border rum smugglers, and that their lives had been threatened. Police also were searching for a bootlegger said to have made a delivery of liquor to Mrs. Sanford at her apartment before she joined her party of friends. The girl thus far has been unable to aid police as hospitals will not permit her to be seen.

Following the party Mrs. Sanford was reported to have gone to her home and gone to bed, losing her sight some time in the night. A "revenge" motive was advanced by police, Raymond Sanford, the girl's husband, was said to be en route from Dallas, Texas, to aid in the investigation.

Customs officials at Phoenix, Ariz., denied last night that Mrs. Sanford had been employed there.
