The need for the expansion is imperative if the school is to meet not only the needs of the probable growth but if it is to be able to carry on the work of its present enrollment in a satisfactory manner.

Both teams put up a good fight, although it was really more like a football game than basketball. Several rough fouls were made and one man was put out of the game on account of having four of them to his credit.

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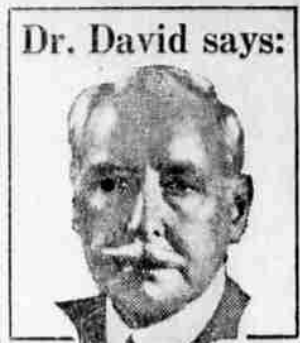
