Mrs. Roy Pruett was visiting Mrs. William Pruett of East Eden on Wednesday of this week.

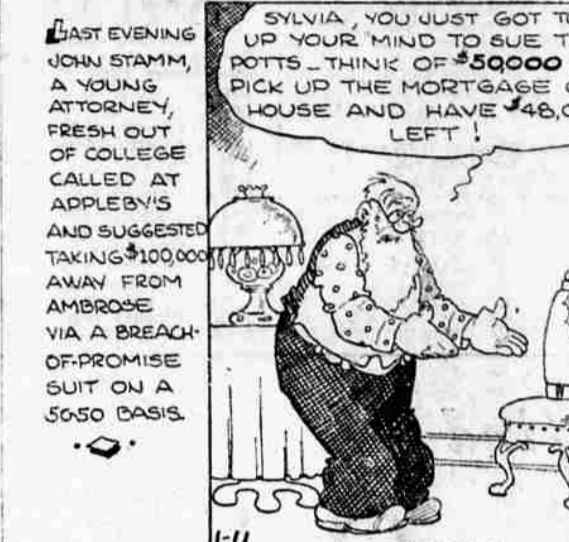

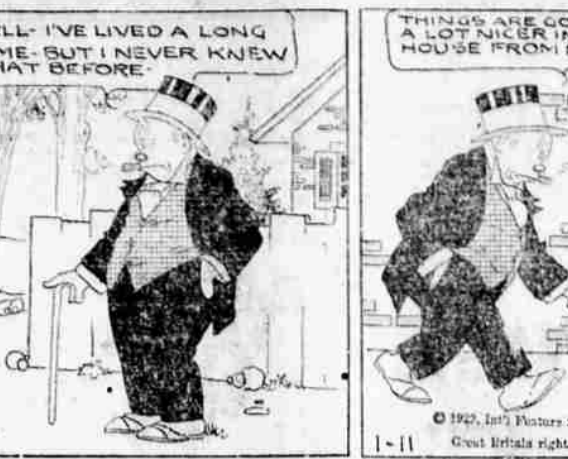
Mrs. Will Payne was brought home from the hospital Sunday, where she had received a week's treatment for severe burns.

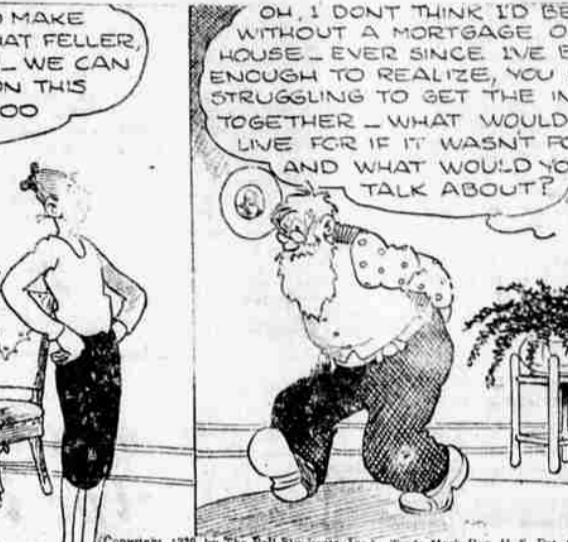
The S. V. I. club will renew their regular meetings again after a discontinuance of several months. The opening meeting will be held on Thursday.

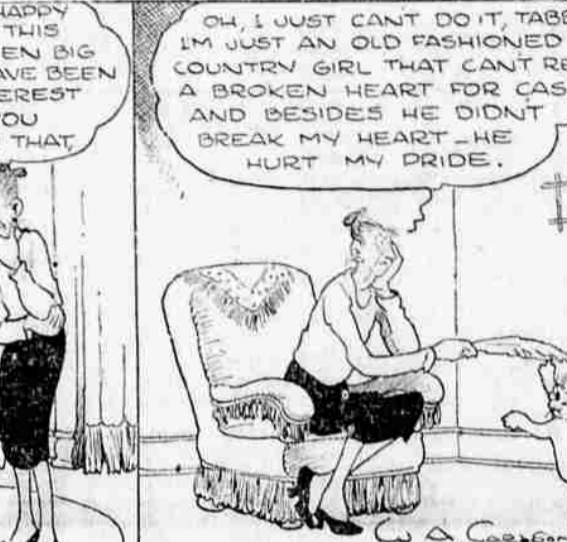

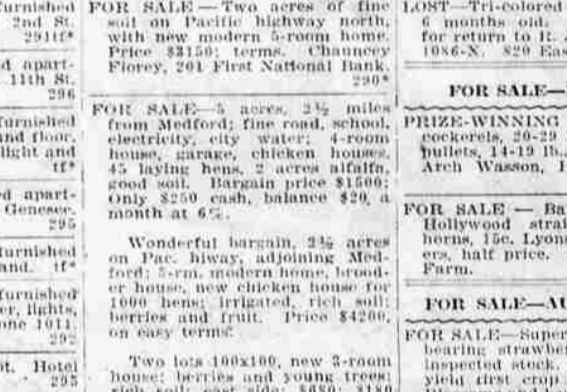
