COUNCIL SEEKING RECTIFICATION OF NON-ATTENDANCE

Under A. J. Cross, councilman of the third ward, resigns his councilmanic seat very soon or returns to Medford and attends city council meetings, the city administration will take steps to declare his seat vacant and appoint some other man to the position, it is said.

The city government has been deprived of Cross's services as councilman for the greater part of the past year, because of his being away from the city most of that time and having attended only one or two council meetings. Thus the third ward during this time has been actually represented by only one councilman, Joseph O. Gray, although being entitled through election to two councilmen.

For some time past the city officials have been discussing a remedy for the situation, in order to insure a quorum at all council meetings. The council is made up of eight members—two from each ward, five constituting a quorum.

Naturally all the councilmen being businessmen, each cannot be present at every meeting, as occasionally one or more is out of the city on business. Then if another councilman or two cannot attend a meeting because of sickness, or some urgent engagement elsewhere, through lack of a quorum important business must go over until the next meeting.

This situation of having only seven members in the city council present at every meeting, as occasionally has been the case, being away, has been talking to the other city officials for some time past. They regard it as unfair to themselves and the city. Several weeks ago former Mayor Alender-
