CHINESE GENERAL EXECUTES RIVALS

TOKYO, Jan. 12. (AP)—The general staff today received an official report confirming that Yang Yu-Ting has been shot to death in Mukden, Manchuria. Another report from Tokyo as it was realized that the situation held dangerous possibilities. Details of the shooting were not received.

Latest unofficial advices from Mukden said that General Chang had invited Yang Yu-Ting and Chang Yin-Huai to his headquarters at 7 o'clock last night. When they arrived they were surrounded by armed soldiers and confined to the room. Then General Chang charged both with certain crimes and later they were led out and summarily shot.

CUT IN GAS PRICE SPREADS OUTSIDE PORTLAND LIMITS

PORTLAND, Jan. 12.—(AP)—The price cutting epidemic that has been raging for days through Portland gasoline retailing circles and has brought the price of motor fuel from 21 1/2 cents a gallon down to 12 1/2 cents, has spread beyond the city limits to nearby communities.

In Gresham several stations are offering gasoline under the 21-cent price. Oregon City, Tualatin, Beaverton and other communities are said to be feeling the war.

The wholesalers and the parent companies say the situation is beyond their control and that the service station operators alone can remedy the situation. They say the price cutting is costing local dealers from \$125,000 to \$250,000 a month.

The average price at which gasoline was selling here today was 17 cents a gallon. This includes the 3-cent state tax.
