FARM POWER COURSE AT O. S. C. IN FEBRUARY

The power farming short course this winter at Oregon State college will be from February 11 to 22, instead of in January as previously announced.

This course is given by the department of agricultural engineering, assisted by specialists from many of the leading equipment companies.

Subject to be covered are operation and maintenance of gasoline engines, electric motors, tractors, trucks, automobiles, pumps, feed preparation machinery and harvesting equipment.

In addition to the lectures and laboratory practice on these subjects, a general educational power farming conference will be held in connection with the school to be open to farmers, retail implement dealers and others interested.
