HIT LEGAL SNAG IN SENTENCE OF BOY AUTO THIEF

Wilson B. Fish, aged 24 years, who confessed that he started from his home in Seattle, Wash., for Los Angeles, Calif., in other people's cars, entered a plea of guilty before Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, to auto theft. With two other youths, unapprehended, he attempted to steal a Dodge sedan from in front of the American Legion hall in Ashland. The trio fled and Fish was arrested next day. He readily admitted his deeds.

Deputy District Attorney Nielsen recommended that Fish be given the minimum sentence of one year in state prison, whereupon the proceedings ran afoot of a legal snag. The defendant was prepared for sentence immediately, but the court held that 24 hours must intervene between the plea of guilty, and the passing of sentence, as provided by the state law unless an emergency exists, when sentence can be passed in six hours. As no emergency existed, the court announced that sentence would be passed tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock.

Fish, in his confession, said that he, with two other boys, stole a Buick car near Hollingham, Wash., and abandoned it near Eugene. He then came to Ashland, where he met two more boys.

Fish wore a high school sweater, with the letter "H" and three stripes, for three years' service upon a basketball team. He told the court that his mother and father were divorced.

LEGION DRUM CORPS AND MEMBERS WILL GO TO GRANTS PASS

The Medford American Legion post will be represented by a large delegation of members, including the drum corps, at the annual conference of the fourth state district, embracing posts in the southern part of the state at Grants Pass next Friday. It was brought out at the regular meeting of the local post last night in response to an invitation extended by a delegation of nine Grants Pass Legionnaires, headed by J. G. Bromley, post commander. A delegation from the local legion auxiliary will also be present.

The conference promises to be one of the best in the history of the district and Grants Pass committees have been working on its program for weeks, according to short talks given by members of the visiting delegation. A business meeting of department and post officers will be held in the afternoon and will be followed by a big banquet after which dancing and other entertainment will be in order.

The Grants Pass visitors included J. G. Bromley, E. W. Coutant, Harry Wehr, Dick Singleton, Robert Harris, Gladwin Smith, Noble Stanton, James Thompson and Neale Allen. Other business matters of last night's meeting included preliminary plans for a big "whoopie" meeting to be held by the post on January 28, featuring a smoker, a feed, a country store and stunts. Committees will be appointed and efforts will be made to make this meeting the best attended in the history of the post. Spanish-American War veterans and Civil War veterans will be invited to be present.

The post went on record in the endorsement of the Community Chest move, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, and listened to plans as outlined by Sealey Hall for the establishment of a new municipal airport. The resignation of R. E. McElhose, as chairman of the playground committee, who felt new duties as city councilman will make it impossible to serve longer, was accepted, and Cole Holmes was appointed to take over his duties as chairman of the Legion committee.

COUNTY TRACING TRUCK ANCESTRY

The county engineering department is busy these days, tracing the ancestry of the 24 trucks, tractors and autos, used in that branch of the county government, so they can procure certificates of titles from the secretary of state, as required by law.

DANE WILLING TO WRESTLE WOOD IN RIALTO THEATER

Facing the prospect of either signing up for a match with Sator Jack Wood or be branded as a wrestler afraid to wrestle, Fred Mortensen, the Terrible Dane of Grants Pass, last night reluctantly signed a contract to meet Wood at the Rialto theater next Monday night. If Mortensen had persisted in refusing the match, either Tom Alley or Chas. Kauffman of Portland would have been matched to meet the local man on the same date. If Wood wins from Mortensen next Monday, there will be no return match and it is probable that the Dane will not appear in Medford again.

Grants Pass fans, followers of Mortensen and some still friends of Wood, brought pressure to bear on the Dane, who was told if he was not man enough to meet Wood, his wrestling days in Grants Pass would be numbered. Grants Pass has faith in its pride of the ring and a large delegation is expected to be present from that city. Wood was mainly anxious to meet Mortensen to prove he was the better man of the two and to add to his wrestling prestige, inasmuch that he is planning to wrestle Portland headliners here soon.

Mortensen has similar ambitions of wrestling Portland men in Grants Pass and believed that by winning his match from Wood two weeks ago had that prospect well in hand, leading him to maintain that a second meeting with Wood would not be necessary.

The school would be located in a new building at the Glendale Colony in the Riverside district half way between the two districts, and would be an accredited school, whereas at the present time neither school is accredited.
