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RETURN PENALTY LOST LUG BOXES IS RECOMMENDED

The care and preservation of lug boxes, and the advertising of receipts for the cooking of pears, were the chief matters before the regular meeting of the Traffic Association at the Hotel Medford this noon.

The lug box situation was referred to the joint consideration of the Fruitgrowers' league at its next meeting and the receipt advertising was placed in the hands of the receipt committee for a conference with the county court on the securing of funds for the printing and distribution of the receipts.

Last year a contest was held to secure the best recipe for the preparation of pears. Only a couple of the packers used the receipts, owing to the lack of time. Nevertheless, over 600 inquiries have been received asking for more pear recipes. The receipts were printed on fruit wrappers. This year it is planned to have a more extensive use and greater variety of receipts.

It is a community benefit proposition, the county court will be asked to lend some financial aid. The lug box situation was discussed after a report by a committee that recommended a clause in the box receipts provide for a small penalty for failure to return or damage.

It was maintained that the lug box was one of the thorns alike to grower and shipper, and that an amelioration would result in a lessening of the packing cost. It was also agreed that handlers of the boxes should not cast them about so roughly. Finally, it was voted that the matter be presented to the Fruitgrowers' league by Paul Scherer.

It developed that there are about 250,000 lug boxes in the valley fruit industry at an estimated cost of \$65,000 and that one-third of this sum is marked off the boxes annually for depreciation.

There were informal discussions of the delay of setting reports from railroads of diversion of fruit shipments in transit and tardiness in the handling of fruit claims.

About 35 packers and shippers were present at the meeting.
