

COWBOYS PURSUE APACHE OUTLAWS MEXICAN BORDER

DEMING, N. M., Jan. 17.—(AP)—Reminiscence of the frontier days of 1880, when General Cook and General Nelson A. Miles, the head of United States troops, pursued and eventually captured an outlaw band of Apache Indians, headed by that wild old chief, Geronimo, Mexican cavaliers and posses of American cowboys today were searching the border on both sides of the Rio Grande for the descendants of that Indian band.

The Apaches, as wild and lawless as they were in the days of Geronimo, are believed to have kidnaped Van Phillips, an American cowpuncher, from the Carretas ranch in Chihuahua, Old Mexico, on January 6.

The American posses are scouring the mountainous country of southwestern New Mexico, while the rurales, led by "Juez de Arce," (Judge of the ropes), one Captain Echevarria, so nicknamed because his powers include the sentencing and execution of prisoners, are seeking the Indians.

FILM SALARIES TO EXTRAS CUT

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Jan. 17.—(AP)—The earnings of Hollywood's film extras slumped more than a third of a million dollars during 1928 and only two of the approximately 15,000 registered extras there averaged as much as five days a week work throughout the year.

PROFESSOR SAYS PACT NULLIFIED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The declaration that the senate's ratification of the Kellogg peace pact is nullified by its consideration of the Cruiser bill was heard today by the conference on the cause and cure of war.

Charging that "the state department follows the dollar," Professor John Howard Latane, head of the department of Latin American studies at Johns Hopkins university, said in a prepared address that American naval construction is determined solely by the desire for American investments abroad, not by peace treaties or agreements.
