TOOTHACHE COMMON AMONG ABORIGINES

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP)—The argument that eating rough foods keeps teeth in good condition may be proved fallacious. Skeletons of 200 Indians, all between 600 to 1,000 years old, are under inspection by Alton K. Fisher of the Milwaukee public museum. The bones were excavated to determine if uncooked food gave the natives perfect teeth. Evidence of numerous diseases of the teeth have caused a refutation of a popular theory. Mr. Fisher has found that Wisconsin Indians suffered from pyorrhea, abscesses, decayed teeth and a variety of infections.
