The Medford committee of the Jackson county health unit met on Monday at the home of Mrs. James Owen on Siskiyou Hill. The women endeavor each meeting to cut and sew enough surgical dressings to supply the nurses during the following month. The expiration of the Sheppard-Towner act and what it will mean to this unit was discussed.

To those interested in public health work everywhere the expiration of this act is of vital importance at this time for which will be introduced, all federal help for promotion of welfare of mothers and babies will cease. During the last six years the bill has been in force the death rate of children has fallen from 75 to 55 per thousand. And it is estimated that at least half of these 128,000 that did die could have been saved their knowledge of fundamental health. The great districts, which special help was administered and efforts concentrated showed more benefit than in the cities. Forty-five mothers participated in the health program and 20 percent of the counties carried on the work.

To substitute the Sheppard-Towner bill the Newton bill will be brought before congress during the present session—it will cost \$1,000,000 of federal money annually for the promotion of welfare work for mother and children. All women's organizations are in favor of it and President Coolidge urges congress "to continue its efforts in behalf of infant mortality and improving mental and bodily conditions of our citizens.
