

ROTARIANS TOLD HOW CITY'S MEN OBTAIN SALARIES

"How I Earn My Salary," was the title of a public confession demanded of three city officers at the Rotary club luncheon this noon.

Fire Chief Roy Elliot diverted the attention of the Rotarians from himself by telling them about the new fire engine and things that had been put into use here since he took office in 1923. He also stated that during the past year the schools of the city had developed the rest of emptying their buildings in one minute's time for fire drill, and that the fire loss in Medford last year amounted to less than \$1.00 per capita.

THOMSON SUCCESSOR ARRIVES FEBRUARY 4 FOR CRATER DUTIES

While making preparations for his departure to Portland this evening to spend several days on official business, Colonel C. O. Thomson, superintendent of Crater National park who was last week promoted to the superintendency of Yosemite National park, effective January 15th, stated that he had just received official word from Washington, D. C. that his successor as superintendent of Crater park would arrive by February 4.

This indicates that the successor has already been selected by the national park service and that his identity will not be made public until about the time he arrives here to assume the superintendency.

It is also a probable indication that Colonel Thomson will be here for a month yet, as it will take two weeks after his successor arrives for the latter to be grounded into the position by the retiring superintendent.

Colonel Thomson, who still here in charge of Crater National park as acting superintendent, appointed as such until his successor arrives, at the same time he was promoted, has already assumed some of the duties of superintendent of Yosemite park. However, inasmuch as Yosemite ranks as one of the two largest and leading national parks, and is over four times as large as Crater park, with a big administrative force, it will take the colonel a long time to get grounded in his new position sufficiently to swing into active personal charge.
