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COURT AGREES ON CUT FOR BUDGET

At a conference held this morning between members of the county court, Assessor J. H. Coleman, District Attorney George A. Roberts representing 15 or 20 new taxpayers, it was decided to defray approximately \$65,200 in unexpended funds, receipts, etc., from the budget. An order to this effect will be signed by the county court.

Assessor Coleman said this afternoon that he estimated that the deduction would mean between a mill and a half cut in the budget as heretofore proposed.

The work of remodeling the budget to conform to the agreement, as reached this morning, is underway and it is expected that it will be ready to turn over to the assessor's office for extension on the tax rolls by late tomorrow.

The matter has been before the county court for nearly a month.
