

KOZER WILL ASK FOR \$8000 FUND TO TEACH ALIENS

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 24.—Special. A recommendation will be made to the present session of the legislature for \$8,000 to cover the yearly work of the state Americanization committee, according to Sam A. Kozar, budget commissioner.

The work of the state Americanization committee entails a large amount of instruction work for the foreign population in the state. The foreigners are given instructions which are necessary before citizenship papers are granted. Approximately 12 per cent, or one in every eight of the population of the state, is foreign born.

For the majority of the counties in the state the foreign born population does not constitute more than 10 per cent of the population. In Coos, Gilliam, Deschutes, Marion, Clackamas, Washington and Tillamook counties, the foreign born population comprises between 10 and 15 per cent of the total. In Multnomah and Columbia counties, the foreign born population approximates 18 per cent and in Clatsop county 30 per cent of the total population.

Of this foreign born population of voting age in the state in 1929, approximately 40,000 were unutilized, of whom more than 25 per cent had taken out first papers for citizenship.

BIRMINGHAM NEGROES CONFESS TO MURDER

LINDEN, Ala., Jan. 24.—(AP)—Jack Brown and Edgar Griffin, negroes of Birmingham, today were under arrest following their confessions to authorities shortly before midnight last night that they had murdered J. R. Moss, 37-year-old postmaster and stockowner of Hugo, Ala., to death Friday night.

Moss' mutilated body was discovered Saturday morning when a patrol called at the postoffice for mail.

Harris hit the aged man on the head, felling him to the floor, according to the confession. Both negroes then obtained a hatchet and an axe and hacked the postmaster to death. The story was rife.

Wall Street Report

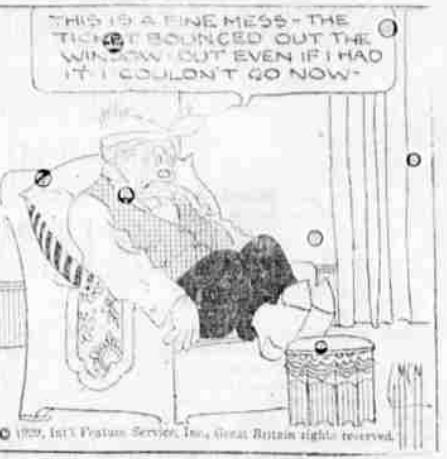
