

POSTOFFICE LIFT GIVEN NEW RULE FOR EFFICIENCY

The general public of Jackson county, which formerly entered the elevator in the federal building with joyous abandon, irrespective of their numbers and careless of calling their floor until it was almost reached it or the lift had passed by, now enters the same elevator until the number reaches twelve, and almost caresses its operator, Dick Calder with their explosive calls of floors.

WARNING WINDS CARRY RELIEF FOR STORM SUFFERERS

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 24.—(AP)—Warm northwest winds, which will blow away the severe cold that has 11 lives in the middle west, was today's promise to storm-bound states suffering the worst rigors of the winter.

Sufficient snow to make footing secure was forecast for Chicago, while a rising temperature of from 10 to 25 degrees above zero was predicted.

The absence of snow here was in contrast to the intense cold and blizzards in the middle west. In parts of Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin, roads were delayed and highways were blocked. In Chicago ice pavements made driving treacherous.

The storm approached blizzards proportions in Michigan, where the cold accounted for five lives. Minnesota had four dead and two deaths here were attributed to the weather.

Schickel is associated with his brothers in the production of pictures. He said this was his first matrimonial venture. He is 35 years old.


