## SECOND SEMESTER TO OPEN MONDAY IN CITY SCHOOLS

Regarding the approaching second semester of the public schools the following notice of changes in the teaching faculty and general school news of high school and grades of interest:

The second semester will open next Monday, January 28th, and while there will be an increased enrollment in all schools, it is not definitely known at this time just what it will be. Advance registration in the high school is already well above the eight hundred mark.

The two new rooms ordered, constructed at the high school will be completed by Contractor A. L. Wilkenson and ready for occupancy by Monday.

The resignation of Miss Nettie Mae Hougen from the high school staff has been accepted by the board on account of ill health and Mrs. Emerson Merrick, a former instructor, engaged to complete the year.

Miss Carol Ramsey, who last semester taught one-half day at the Junior high school, is to be given full time at the high school building with the vocations and industries courses, and freshman history.

Mrs. W. H. Carpenter, a half-time teacher, has been assigned Miss Ramsey's classes at the Junior high.

In the elementary schools no additional teachers are contemplated at this time. Miss Laura West of the Lincoln school has been given a leave of absence by the school board to visit Europe. Mrs. Walter Cosmeau has been assigned as substitute in handling Mrs. West's work.

Monday forenoon will be given over to promotion and registration of pupils in the elementary schools. This work has already been practically completed in the high and Junior high schools.

First grade pupils who will be 12 years of age before March 4, 1929, are accepted without question. Pupils who are younger but who will be six by June 7th, may apply for admission by test. Parents of such children desiring to enter should call Mrs. Geo. H. Conode, Phone 239-L, for appointments.

A third non-verdict bill was returned yesterday by the grand jury which closed its session last night following deliberations since Monday. A non-verdict bill was returned in the case of the state vs. Nee Mathews of Eagle Point on charges of the possession of illicit whisky.

Two true bills were returned on non-verdict still charges against Ted Smith and Frank Gotsche, arrested in the Eagle Point district late last year for the possession of a still near the Doghouse bridge. A true bill was also returned against F. Stone, local resident on a bad check charge, involving the cashing of a worthless \$19 check. Stone is believed to be in California at the present time.

The jury earlier in the week freed Earl Swisher and William Jeffries on manslaughter charges resulting from auto accidents in the Green Spring mountains and had no special report to make when it adjourned yesterday.

## COURT WILL HEAR ROAD PETITIONERS NEXT WEDNESDAY

Two road hearings have been set for the session of the county court next Wednesday. One is the petition of Jacksonville citizens protesting the closing of the "Old Krutzler Mill road," so Jones & Co. can comply with the state law in the construction of a proposed \$50,000 parking plant, and the other is a petition of Eugene Rover and Evans Creek residents for road improvement on Evans creek.

It is understood a compromise has been effected in the Jacksonville petition.

The Rogue River-Evans Creek petitioners ask that the route of the Evans Creek road be changed, so as to shorten the distance, and to eliminate two railroad crossings. The road on the north side of Rogue River was built in pioneer days, and affects about 50 residents of the Evans Creek valley.

The petition for the construction of the so-called Midway Highway between the Modoc Orchard and the Dr. Sweeney gate on the Pacific highway, is scheduled for a hearing next month. While many of the property owners in the district favor the building of the road, others whose property would be traversed oppose. The highway would provide a shorter and more direct route to this city and Central Point.

The county court still has under advisement the petition to annex the "peninsula" of the Phoenix school district to the Medford school district.
