ALBANY AUTO WAS ON LEFT SIDE OF ROAD IS VERDICT

ALBANY, Ore., Jan. 26.—(AP)—One of the dead has been placed the blame for an automobile accident near here Thursday which resulted in the death of two young men, possibly fatal injuries to another, and the blinding for life of a young girl.

A coroner's jury here last night found that blame for the accident should rest with Delbert Ackerman, 22, who died instantly when his automobile crashed head-on with another driven by Charles Manning, 19.

The coroner found that Ackerman was driving on the wrong side of the highway, without cause.

Manning was in a critical condition with a broken jaw, loss of one eye, a compound fracture of the arm, and terrible cuts and bruises.

CORSICAN BANDITS CAREER IS ENDED

BASTIA, Corsica, Jan. 26.—(AP)—Six times sentenced to death by default, Francois Marie Carrelli, one of the worst surviving Corsican bandits, has been laid low at last.

His criminal record began in 1907 when he was sentenced to five years' imprisonment for homicide. On release he took to the bush and carried on a vendetta against the witnesses who appeared against him at his trial and their families, exterminating most of them.

One of his worst crimes was the murder of the young daughter of a man whom he suspected of giving information about him to the police. He shot the girl as she was drawing water at a fountain and forbade the villagers to bury her under pain of terrible reprisals, saying "crows will dispose of the body."

SMITH FINDS TIGER TRAITOR TO PARTY

SARASOTA, Fla., Jan. 26.—(AP)—Former Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York is certain the Ringling zoo here harbors a "Republican" tiger.

He was convinced of it yesterday when soon after his arrival in Sarasota, he paid a visit to the winter quarters of the Ringling Brothers circus, with William F. Kenney of New York and John J. Haskok, chairman of the Democratic national committee.

As Mr. Smith stopped before the cage of a large Bengal tiger, the animal, apparently alarmed by some movement in the crowd, leaped through a door in his cage into an outer pen.

"He must have been a Republican," Mr. Smith said.

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—(AP)—Increase of the membership of the New York stock exchange by 25 per cent making the roster 1575, and with each member given the right to dispose of his proportional part of the increase within three years, has been recommended to members by the governing committee. It is expected that a vote of the membership necessary to approval of the increase, will be taken within two weeks.

DESERTION MOTHER TURNS ON GAS JETS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 26.—(AP) Desertion because of ill health, Mrs. Frank E. Portello yesterday closed all windows of her home, darkened the shades and, turned on the three gas burners in the kitchen stove.

When Frank Portello returned home he found their 16-month-old baby dead in its crib and the mother lying across the infant's body. A few moments later the mother died.

JUSTICE COURT HEARS WOOD CONTRAST SUIT AGAINST O. N. WILSON

The civil suit of George A. Seeley and F. Girard against O. N. Wilson, well known pioneer resident, for alleged non-fulfillment of a second cutting contract on a piece of land on Griffin creek, was under way in Justice of the Peace Glenn O. Taylor's court today.

The action grew out of the wood cutting operations of Seeley and Girard. They allege that after the second cutting of the contract was forbidden, and that the state of the spring weather and the condition of the roads played a more or less important part. Checks issued by both litigants were introduced as exhibits.
