

NEW OIL STATION TO BE OPENED ON ASHLAND MAIN ST.

ASHLAND, Jan. 28.—(Special)—A new oil station with all accessories and other products is to be opened in the corner of the Ashland hotel building and is to be managed by Grover Leach. Next west of the service station, the road will have its electrical goods store.

The front wall of a hotel building has been already torn out of the corner and work is progressing rapidly on the remodeling as to have it finished by February 15, if possible. The plans have been drawn by architect E. Barry and the cost of the improvement will probably be about \$5000.

The station will have an entrance from Pioneer avenue on the side as well as from Main street in front. In the rear room, behind his store, Grover will have ample space for his battery shop which will be entered from the side street. The whole improvement will add a good deal to the attractiveness of this corner, which has been unused for several months of the time during the last year.

The Independent Truck Line, heretofore operated by C. W. Clark for several years, has been purchased by Charles L. May, who formerly owned and operated the same line on North Main street. The line operates between Ashland and Medford. Clark expects to go into the lumber business.
