OREGON U NEEDS TOLD BY REPORT SUB-COMMITTEE

SALFEM, Ore., Jan. 26.—The present library building at the University of Oregon is insufficient to house the present library of more than 200,000 volumes. Dr. H. H. Kinder, dean of the library, is antiquated and is being put to more use than is ad- visable; the extension department which is largely self supporting is being housed in a frame shack; hospital and infirmary facilities are not meeting requirements. These statements are made in the report to the ways and means committee by the University of Oregon sub- committee which visited the uni- versity last Saturday.

BABE IS WILLED \$5 BY LATE WIFE \$50,000 FOR GIRL

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—The true relationship of the "mystery child" to Babe Ruth's late wife was established today in Mrs. Ruth's will. The document filed in surrogate's court left the bulk of \$50,000 es- tate to "my beloved charge and ward, Dorothy Helen Ruth, at one time known as Marie Harrington." Babe Ruth was cut off with a be- quest of \$5. The same amount was left to Mrs. Ruth's mother and to each of her four brothers and sis- ters. At the time of Mrs. Ruth's death in a fire which destroyed the home of Dr. E. H. Kinder, dentist, of Watertown, Mass., January 11, con- flicting reports were in circulation regarding whether Dorothy was the offspring of the ball player and his wife or a foster child. In the petition for probate filed by James J. Conlin, named as sole executor of the estate, it was de- clared "on information and belief" the said Dorothy Helen Ruth is not an heir and next of kin of the de- cedent herein, but she is referred to herein for the reason that she stood in the legally acknowledged relation of child with the said de- cedent.

Sports TWO TEAMS IN BASKET BATTLE NORTH DIVISION

Washington Huskies and Staters Undefeated in Di- vision Season—California Supreme in South Confer- ence Race.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 29.—With California holding a commanding position in the race for basketball title of the southern division of the Pacific Coast con- ference, a two-way fight for the northern division championship has developed between Washington and Washington State. California has won its string of conference vic- tories to five, and with no de- feats this far, the Bears are look- ing for an almost sure winners of the southern division title. Wash- ington is in second position with two victories and one defeat, but they were crushed, 41-22, by the Bears last Saturday, and will probably end the season to second place. The Washington Huskies in the northern division have a conference record of two victories and no de- feats. They took their second vic- tory against a powerful rival, Stan- ford, the Oregon State quintet, 23-10, last Friday and showed a world of power in doing it.

PENN UNIVERSITY TO LIMIT SPORTS FOR UNDERGRADS

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 29.—The University of Pennsylvania today announced a new departure regarding control of undergradu- ates in sport competition. Here- after freshmen will be limited to participation in but one sport, except in rare instances, and inter- collegiate will be held on two terms of competition, except in particular cases. The new policy, which the re- cently organized coaches associa- tion will put into effect begin- ning February 11.

CHICAGO BANTAM BIDS FOR HONORS. LOS ANGELES, Jan. 26.—It looks like Earl Mastey, South- al Chicago coach, will have to be con- sidered with before championship title honors are definitely settled. The eleven mid-west quarter- back night in a 10-round bout that was one of the fastest and most colorful ever seen in this section, outpointed Kid Francis, the Italian pugilist, in masterful fashion. The sixth saw Francis at his best, but Mastey, having solved his peculiar style, had the best of the going thereafter. He took two of the rounds, and held Francis even in the others.
