Eggs underwent a nice emulative rise when standard extras and standard firsts scooped up two cents to 45 cents and medium extras took a similar rise to 37 and medium firsts to 31 cents.

Butterfat was quoted at 36 cents station, and 47 cents track, and 45 to 46 cents delivered Portland.

Onton sets went down from 10 to 11 cents to 7 and 8 cents. No material change were noted in fruits and vegetables.
