GAME COMMISSION TO RAISE MALLARD DUCKS

The Oregon State Game commission, in conjunction with the Southern Fish and Game association is undertaking the experiment of raising mallard ducks on Walton lake near the town of Sheeh. Sportsmen of Lin county are donating a number of their ducks and the game department will keep a sufficient number of mallards for breeding purposes. The wings of the ducks will be plucked so that they cannot fly. The department is cooperating with the sportsmen of the Corvallis Rod and Gun club in a similar experiment at Winkle lake, which is nine miles south of Corvallis. The start will be made with 100 pair of domestic ducks and ducks and additions will be made from time to time. The Corvallis sportsmen believe that the original number will be increased to better than 100,000 in five years. Both Walton and Winkle lakes will be made game refuges.

PARKER PREDICTS BRIGHTER FUTURE POULTRY RAISING

A brighter future looks for the poultry industry of Jackson county. Chas. B. Parker, manager of the Faira Co-operative Exchange stated yesterday at the meeting for the election of three trustees to liquidate the affairs of the Poultry Raisers' Association of Southern Oregon, and merge with the Exchange.

Lower rates on egg shipments to Portland via the Southern Pacific, whereby less than costed lots would be received meant a faster market for local poultry products by opening the way for the establishment of a branch of the Pacific Co-operative Egg Exchange in this city. The Pacific Co-operative now controls the Klamath egg market. Conditions would shape themselves so the Rogue River valley egg would enter that field without competition. Manager Parker held this valley was the natural egg supply source of Klamath county and northern California.

WILL SCAN TAX COST SHEET
